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<div><h2>The Mail</h2><p>Deadly Suarez makes the difference again</p><p>After a win like this, it is difficult to put a figure on Luis Suarez's value to Liverpool, but it stands somewhere between an enormous amount and priceless. Not that the Uruguayan is for sale, whatever reports of Roberto Mancini's interest at Manchester City claim.</p><p>Two more goals taken with clinical efficiency took the 25-year-old forward's Premier League tally for the season to 10. The rest of Liverpool's squad have scored six league goals between them. 'He's a master marksman, absolutely outstanding,' said Liverpool boss Brendan Rodgers, adding he is not concerned about too much pressure being on one man to deliver. 'Luis thrives on it,' he said. Suarez was also involved in the build-up to Liverpool's third goal from Jose Enrique, but Rodgers insisted the praise should be spread wider.</p><p>'The superlatives are for the team,' he said.</p><p>'They were outstanding. Luis took his goals well and his movement was outstanding, but this was about the team.'</p><p>Enrique shone when the hosts came alive after an indifferent first half, but not as brightly as 17-year-old Raheem Sterling, who created the first and was heavily involved in the third goal.</p><p>But Liverpool fans know they desperately need reinforcements and Rodgers expects some movement in the next transfer window.</p><p>'We'll see what January brings,' he said. "Absolutely not," Werner said. "He's a beautiful player to watch and, as a Liverpool fan, I hope I'm watching him for many years to come. We made a long-term contract with him and we are going to see a lot of his play at Liverpool."</p><p>Every time Werner or principal owner John Henry venture across the Atlantic, one imagines them in their firefighting costume, arriving at the Shankly Gates and asking stewards for the directions to the latest inferno that needs extinguishing. The blaze of publicity surrounding Suarez's future is not of their making, but it does no harm to occasionally offer public assurance in the face of the more scurrilous rumours that FSG would cash in for the right price.</p><p>Liverpool supporters have been in the market for more promise and less 'under delivery' over the last few months - particularly on the issue of player recruitment - and FSG is in territory where the goodwill for not being Tom Hicks and George Gillett has somewhat run its course.</p><p>Despite the win here, the need for Liverpool to buy rather than sell in January is apparent. Werner robustly confirmed Liverpool's plans.</p><p>"Our intention is to strengthen, but actions will speak louder than words," he said.</p><p>"We are playing better and better each week. We have made some mistakes in the past but our intention is to deliver, strengthen the squad and move forward. We know January is a challenging time and I don't want to say we've got x or y but, hopefully, the fans will be pleased with what we do accomplish."</p><p>As a Los Angeles television and film producer, Werner can watch Suarez and appreciate the box-office appeal of a charismatic leading man. He must be tempted to ask the club's marketing department to add a 'double O' in front of Suarez's No 7. The Uruguayan is the man with the golden touch, granted a licence to thrill, consistently intervening to prevent Liverpool's sky falling in.</p><p>Suarez's double, Raheem Sterling's excellent second half and Jose Enrique's reinvention as a goalscoring left winger extended an unbeaten streak in the league to seven. Sterling, who created two of the goals, also has admirers hoping to demolish Liverpool's reputation as a club who can fulfil the ambitions of their best players. "Raheem is in a real good place here," manager Brendan Rodgers said. "He will tie himself down to a new contract because he wants to be here and he can be a great here."</p><p>It was against Wigan last season Sterling made his debut, a late substitute in a defeat that assisted Kenny Dalglish's demise and earned Roberto Martinez a Liverpool job interview. "I can see huge, huge progress," Martinez said. "When we saw him that day a year ago, you could see the real potential."</p><p>Wigan fancied their chances of a repeat victory at half-time, but Jean Beausejour's poor pass enabled Sterling to feed Suarez on 47 minutes and it could have been a rout afterwards. Martinez's mood darkened when he discovered Ben Watson suffered a broken leg after colliding with Sterling in the first half. There was no blame attached to the Liverpool youngster, who later apologised.</p><p>In the end it was a comfortable home victory, Werner able to return to the United States to prepare for the next, inevitable bout of firefighting when the transfer window opens.</p></div>						

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Sterling will sign a new contract, insists Rodgers
 He might make more money elsewhere but Brendan Rodgers is confident that the opportunities Raheem Sterling will be given at Liverpool will make him stay.
 Saturday's 3-0 victory over Wigan was the 11th straight league game the 17-year-old had started, although the fact that his contract runs out in June next year has led to a frenzy of speculation about his future.
 The size of his salary is thought to be the greatest sticking point. Last week Sterling tweeted that it was "rubbish" he was holding out for [pounds sterling]50,000 a week, more than double what Liverpool are prepared to offer. However, that tweet was swiftly deleted due to the sensitivity of the issue.
 Yesterday, he tweeted again, apologising for a collision that led to Wigan's Ben Watson breaking his leg.
 When the Liverpool manager was asked if he feared an approach for Sterling from other clubs, especially in London, where he grew up, Rodgers said: "They would be wasting his time.
 "Raheem is in a real good place. He has been given an opportunity here this season and he is thriving on it. He will tie himself to a new contract because he wants to be here. He can be a great at this football club.
 "The message is very simple. We are trying to drive the club forward over the next couple of years and there will be a little bit of pain along the way. However, there are not many teams in the Premier League who are starting with three teenagers. And why would you want to leave one of the biggest clubs in world football? It's a no-brainer."
 Having committed themselves to paying Joe Cole, Jordan Henderson and Stewart Downing - three players with a very limited future at Anfield - a combined [pounds sterling]200,000 a week, there is a pressing need to reduce the wage bill at Liverpool.
 However, the Liverpool chairman, Tom Werner, yesterday gave reassurances that not only would his Fenway Sports Group not countenance the sale of Luis Suarez, they were prepared for substantial expansion in the January transfer window.
 "Obviously, we have made some mistakes in the past," he said in relation to Liverpool's wage bill. "However, our intention now is to deliver a priority product and strengthen the squad but actions will speak louder than words. I don't want to say more than that. We know that January is a challenging time and I don't want to say that we have got X or Y lined up but, hopefully, the fans will be very pleased with what we do accomplish."
 Two Januaries ago, FSG approved the purchase of Suarez from Ajax, the only one of the big signings made under Kenny Dalglish who still has a future on Merseyside. When asked if he would even countenance the striker's departure, Werner replied: "Absolutely not."
 He added: "He is a beautiful player to watch and, as a Liverpool fan, I am hoping to watch him for many years to come. We made a long contract with him in the summer and we are going to see a lot of his play at Liverpool."



Luis Suarez at the double as the Reds cruise to victory
 Steven Gerrard has been The Man at Liverpool for more than a decade but it seems the mantle must now be passed to Luis Suarez.
 While Gerrard remains an inspiring force at this club, the Uruguay striker has become the player they cannot do without.
 The stats swats tell us that Suarez's contribution as provider and scorer accounts for all but two of Liverpool's points.
 What cannot be disputed is that he lifted Anfield's growing anxiety with two smartly-taken goals and a significant hand in the third from Joe Enrique.
 Thanks to Suarez's 10 Premier League goals and regular assists, Liverpool are mid-table and daring to believe in much better.
 A credible future without Suarez is surely unthinkable. The ovation he received when he departed, four minutes from the end, was testament to his stature.
 Much as he has declared his commitment to the club, those fans know he will require evidence that Liverpool's aspirations match his own.
 Suarez might have had at least two more goals as Wigan's resistance crumbled in the second half. Roberto Martinez's side never seriously threatened to repeat their Anfield victory last season and long before the end were in disarray.
 But they were not helped when midfielder Ben Watson broke a leg after challenging Raheem Sterling for a high ball midway through the first half.
 He was helped off without the aid of a stretcher but Martinez confirmed afterwards: "It's a break. It was a pure accident. Both players were looking at the ball."
 Liverpool manager Brendan Rodgers was reluctant to heap all the praise on Suarez, contending it was a day to acclaim the whole team. But he acknowledged: "Luis is a wonderful striker, a master marksman and absolutely outstanding.
 "I'm not concerned he is carrying too much of the burden for the team. He thrives on it, the freedom of playing as a loose striker. He's at the pinnacle and getting goals.
 "We'll see what the January transfer window brings and try to get him some support."
 Wigan were stunned by Watson's broken leg and angered that Suarez escaped punishment for a challenge on substitute David Jones.
 Martinez said: "Suarez was lucky because he stamped on Jones and that is not the sign of a top player."
 Pepe Reina, restored to the Liverpool goal after missing seven matches with a hamstring injury, watched contentedly as the action developed at the other end.
 Daniel Agger went close with a couple of headers and Wigan goalkeeper Ali Al-Habsi did well to keep out Suso's 25-yard blast.
 But Wigan unravelled in the second half. Jean Beausejour's back pass sold Maynor Figueroa short, Sterling stole the ball and cut it back for Suarez to put Liverpool in front.
 Suarez then timed his run perfectly to collect Enrique's through-ball and beat the advancing Al-Habsi.
 In his excitement, he went for his hat-trick and dragged the ball out for a throw-in. He did, however, link with Sterling to create the third. Al-Habsi parried the England youngster's cross and Enrique tapped in his first goal for the club.



TWO goals from Luis Suarez and another from Jose Enrique saw Latics crash 3-0 at Liverpool - and there was more bad news for Wigan with Ben Watson stretchered off in agony after breaking his leg.
 The visitors had more than held their own during an even first half, overcoming the early loss of Watson after a freak collision with Raheem Sterling to go in at half time on level terms. Sterling apologised for his part in the incident after the match and Watson could be out for four months.
 But Suarez broke the deadlock within two minutes of the restart with a deadly finish from 10 yards - and after that there was only one winner.
 The Uruguayan quickly made it two with a beautiful finish from Enrique's through ball.
 And Enrique grabbed number three himself from close range after Raheem Sterling's shot was parried by Ali Al Habsi.

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 <p>LUIS SUAREZ inspired Liverpool with a double strike as the Reds defeated Wigan Athletic to claim their third league win of the season.</p> <p>Two second half goals from the Uruguayan and a first goal for the club from Jose Enrique saw Brendan Rodgers move up two places in the Premier League table. They would be wasting their time, he says. Raheem is in a real good place here. The kid has been brilliant. We just have to nurture that.</p> <p>What I like now is that you are seeing that little bit of arrogance with the ball. He is comfortable now.</p> <p>He will tie down himself to a new contract because he wants to be here and he can be a great here at this football club.</p> <p>And why would you want to leave one of the biggest clubs in world football? It's a no-brainer.</p> <p>Suarez may have found the target twice more at the weekend but the Uruguayan found himself sharing centre stage with Sterling, the youngster contributing two assists to draw a satisfying line under another week in his dizzying rise up the ranks having made his full England debut in Sweden on Wednesday.</p> <p>He knows he has a lot to learn and a lot to improve on, but you see him and Suarez combining better in each game, says Rodgers.</p> <p>Coming off the back of his international debut and playing 86 minutes and then coming back here and playing 90 minutes and looking like he could play another 90 minutes at the end of the game it's just amazing.</p> <p>Also amazing is the fact its less than eight months since Sterling made his first-team bow as a late substitute for Liverpool in the 2-1 home defeat to Wigan in March.</p> <p>And Latics manager Roberto Martinez, who lost out to Rodgers in the battle to replace Kenny Dalglish in the summer, has been unsurprised by the wingers subsequent impact.</p> <p>He has made huge, huge progress, says Martinez. But when we saw him that day last season, you could see the real potential.</p> <p>I think when you have players who take people on, that make things happen, you can see he's a very direct, talented player and he's going to have a very bright future.</p> <p>A piece of alert play from Sterling, allied to a tactical switch from Rodgers, shook Liverpool out of their first-half stupor on Saturday to ensure only their third Premier League win of the season and just their eighth in 27 home league games.</p> <p>Until the manager made the decision to replace Suso with Jordan Henderson eight minutes before the break, Liverpool, employing their usual 4-2-3-1 formation, had been lethargic, lackadaisical and lacking in ideas.</p> <p>Henderson, sent on to help Steven Gerrard support Suarez, brought much-needed energy to the midfield, his ever-willing nature swiftly winning approval from the home crowd.</p> <p>We had to flip it round a wee bit in order to get the control of the game, but once we got that first goal you saw the benefit of that, admits Rodgers.</p> <p>We are not a team that wants the game to come to us, we want to create and really get on the front foot and apply pressure and I thought, in particular in the second half the pressure was outstanding.</p> <p>That difference was apparent just two minutes into the second half. Sterling pounced after Jean Beausejour sold Maynor Figueroa short, the wingers cut-back smashed clinically into the top corner by Suarez.</p> <p>Jose Enrique, like Henderson, has been expected to join Andy Carroll, Charlie Adam and the outgoing Stewart Downing in Rodgers cull of the Dalglish-Damien Comolli regime.</p> <p>While both may yet face a similar fate, they did their long-term cause no harm here with Enrique, encouraging as a makeshift left-winger at Chelsea last week, reprising the role to an even more impressive level.</p> <p>On 57 minutes, the Spaniard drifted in off the left flank and, with the outside of his left boot, deftly rolled through an inviting pass for Suarez to burst between two Wigan defenders and toe-poke into the bottom corner.</p> <p>Enrique then scored his first Liverpool goal in his 53rd appearance, prodding home from close range after Sterling played a one-two with Suarez and saw his shot parried by goalkeeper Ali Al Habsi, although Wigan were right to bemoan not being awarded the throw-in that sparked the move.</p> <p>It says much, of course, that Rodgers turned to Enrique, who had previously scored only one goal in more than five years in English football, to bolster an attack that remains overly-reliant on Suarez.</p> <p>Suarez, Henderson, Glen Johnson and Jonjo Shelvey all could have added to Liverpools tally, with a disappointing Wigans only response a shot directed wastefully over by substitute Jordi Gomez.</p> <p>Despite Liverpool extending their unbeaten Premier League run to seven games, watching Liverpool chairman Tom Werner will appreciate reinforcements remain desperately required in January to help Suarez and Sterling not replace them.</p> <p>MAN OF THE MATCH. 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Suarez walks on, but mostly alone
The greatest football heroes do not play in great teams. Like Diego Maradona at Napoli or Steven Gerrard in the European Cup final in Istanbul, they often provide the only pathway to glory. Or like Alan Shearer at Newcastle they are a bulwark against mediocrity.
Luis Suarez falls into the second camp. His position at Liverpool is probably not that dissimilar to what it was when he played football in the streets of Montevideo. He is the first pick and everything revolves around placing a football at his feet.
When Suarez latched on to Raheem Sterling's pull-back and drove the ball into the roof of Ali Al-Habsi's net, the television commentator shouted: "And where would Liverpool be without him?" Since he has scored 10 of their 17 goals and provided two assists, the answer is deep in the relegation zone.
Brendan Rodgers was anxious to stress that, despite all the statistics to the contrary, Liverpool are more than a one-man team, although he described Suarez as a "master marksman". His opposite number, Roberto Martinez, however, preferred to focus on his darker side.
"He scored from the first mistake we made and his finish was that of a top player," the Wigan manager said. "From then on, we opened up and created spaces and that is when he really enjoys his football. But he was very fortunate because he stamped on David Jones and it would have been a red card if the referee had seen it. That was not the sign of a top player."
What added to Martinez's frustration was that once more Wigan's small squad suffered after an international break and that the loss of Ben Watson, who broke a leg in a collision with Sterling, made that squad smaller still. It was an accident but the crack as the two men collided was sickening and Martinez confirmed the worst.
Wigan had become a strange kind of bogey side to Liverpool in the same way that in their glory years, they always had problems with Leicester. Their last victory over Wigan was three years and as many managers ago. However, Rodgers pointed out that this time Liverpool took their chances.
It began with an error, which if it was Wigan's first of the afternoon, as Martinez claimed, was instantly punished. Jean Beausejour spun around in horror after his sloppy back pass was intercepted by Sterling. The Uruguayan's instinct did the rest. It was the fifth consecutive game in which he had scored.
That was when the game changed. Hitherto, Liverpool had performed much as they had all season, with plenty of possession but not much edge, typified by a sequence of passes that began near the Wigan area and finished with Daniel Agger passing back to his goalkeeper, Pepe Reina, returning for the first time in six weeks and greeted by a giant banner on the Kop with his picture and the slogan "No Pasaran". Apart from a shot that struck his post, not much from Wigan did threaten to pass.
Rodgers removed another much younger Spaniard, Suso, well before half-time on the grounds that "our organisation at the front end of the field was not what I wanted" but once Suarez struck, Liverpool's confidence returned.
The mood was best displayed in a lovely ball from Jose Enrique that Suarez, running between two defenders, seized upon. Al-Habsi came out but the shot was past him almost before he could spread himself. There might have been a hat-trick to match the one at Norwich but, after wriggling through, Suarez found only the side-netting.
The third extinguished whatever resistance Wigan had left as a one-two involving Sterling and Suarez was parried by Al-Habsi's gloves into Jose Enrique's path. Rodgers had used the left back as a winger and pointed out that Gareth Bale had made the same transformation. Since this was Enrique's first Premier League goal, this was perhaps a comparison too far.

It is not surprising Brendan Rodgers rejects the notion his side have become a one-man band, utterly dependant on Luis Suarez.
But as Suarez inspired victory over Wigan, it was impossible not to see him as charismatic front man, percussionist, rhythm guitarist and keyboardist rolled into one during the 3-0 win.
In the eyes of Roberto Martinez, he was also chief protagonist for less savoury reasons. He accused the Uruguayan of stamping on midfielder David Jones.
As Anfield rose to applaud Suarez when he was substituted three minutes from time, Martinez did not join the ovation.
"There was a stamp. That's not the sign of a top player," said Martinez, who also lost Ben Watson with a broken leg.
"Things happen in a game and he was lucky today. It wasn't a nasty game. The broken leg was an accident. When you see the replay of the challenge on Jones you see the stamp, but that's the nature of the game. If the referee doesn't see it you are lucky."
Anfield was too busy rocking to Suarez's beat in a rampant second half to notice anything untoward.
Suarez scored two and had a role in the third for Jose Enrique as Rodgers' men showed the panache he's been promising since assuming control.
Enrique and Raheem Sterling played their part, but Suarez already has 10 league goals this season. It was he who transformed the mood at Anfield from despondent during a goalless first half to exuberant by full-time. Rodgers, understandably, wants the focus to be on the team rather than his No7, but his intention is to build a side around his striker.
"It's not just Luis Suarez. He is a wonderful striker and he is paid to score but lots of other teams have strikers who finish off good work by the team," said Rodgers.
"He is a master marksman and we are thrilled to have him, but the ethos is on the team. He's not at all worried at having too much burden to score. He thrives on it."
Liverpool are unbeaten in seven league games. Had they not drawn so often they would be talking more confidently about a top-four finish. There were also reminders of the challenge ahead, however.
Aside from the loss of Watson following an innocuous challenge, Martinez - who could as easily have been in the home dugout after his coffee morning in Florida with John Henry last May - was the happier coach at half-time.
His mood darkened because Liverpool were unrecognisable in the second half, helped by some poor Wigan defending.
Martinez felt fatigue after the international break was a factor, but it didn't affect Liverpool.
Rodgers demanded a higher tempo at half-time and the improvement was instantly rewarded when Jean Beausejour's weak pass left Maynor Figueroa stranded.
Sterling stole in and crossed for Suarez who finished emphatically. No gifts were required for Suarez's second after 58 minutes, as Enrique slipped the striker through for a sublime finish with the outside of his right foot.
Enrique then tapped in the third after 65 minutes after more fine work from Sterling as the Kop finally enjoyed a nerveless finale to a home fixture.

IF BRENDAN RODGERS, or anyone else for that matter, were even considering the sale of Luis Suarez, then here was evidence to dismiss such thoughts as ludicrous. Suarez was the perfect spearhead in 20 minutes of attacking excellence in a second half brimful of pace and endeavour that not only produced Liverpool's second home win in the Premier League this season but also demonstrated how invaluable a role the Uruguayan must play in the rebuilding process going on at Anfield.
Praise for Suarez was tempered by a suggestion from Wigan's manager, Roberto Martinez, that the Uruguayan stamped on substitute David Jones midway through the second half. The alleged offence went unpunished by referee Kevin Friend. "That is not the sign of a top player and it could have been a red card if the referee had seen it," Martinez said. Jones managed to play on without any treatment and Martinez added: "But he [Friend] didn't see so I think Suarez would be unlucky for anything more to come of it. Good luck to him."
Rodgers was reluctant to single out anyone for praise but after being pressed on Suarez's importance to the team, the Liverpool manager conceded: "He is a master marksman. He thrives on the responsibility and enjoys playing in this system and is enjoying that freedom of being the loose striker. But the most pleasing thing about this victory is the ethos of the team and Luis finishes off great work."
Liverpool's approach play was neat and accurate but only Suarez seemed to offer a threat inside the penalty area. A three-man Wigan central defensive unit, marshalled by the uncompromising Gary Caldwell, seemed equipped to deal with any danger.
But Liverpool returned for the second half intent on forcing the play and within two minutes of the restart there was a reward. Jean Beausejour attempted a back pass that could only be termed reckless and 17-year-old Raheem Sterling intercepted and crossed for Suarez to volley past a helpless Ali Al Habsi, the Wigan goalkeeper.
The goal was a catalyst for Liverpool's play to blossom. Previously the only real threat seemed to come from a series of set-pieces, inevitably involving Steven Gerrard, but suddenly there was flair all across the pitch. Sterling was given room to display his skills and Jose Enrique, employed in a more advanced role and given licence to attack, took to the role with vigour.
Wigan had become something of a bogey side for Liverpool, going the five previous fixtures between the two clubs unbeaten. But the heart appeared to be taken out of the visitors' challenge when Ben Watson was carried off after half-an-hour with a broken leg after a tackle from Sterling.
Liverpool then ran at Wigan with little resistance and nobody was more threatening than Enrique. "I looked at the way Gareth Bale has been pushed forward from being a full-back to a wide attacking midfield player and I thought Jose could play that role because of his power and his pace," Rodgers said. Such was the case as the Spaniard, signed from Newcastle for [pounds sterling]5m in August of 2011 with thoughts of playing nowhere other than left-back, surged forward and played a precise pass into the path of Suarez, who drilled the chance home.
Suarez then turned provider as he exchanged passes with Sterling for the young winger to cross low and Enrique to hit his first Premier League goal.
