"HE experts have argued for months about it . . . is this the greatest Liverpool team of all time?

Now, as the Anfield kings celebrate yet another League title, we have the answer from the man who should know — skipper Alan Hansen.

After the euphoria of Liverpool's champagne party to celebrate their 17th League crown, Hansen admitted: "This

could be the greatest team, but we're not there

"We've done it in style this season, scoring lots of goals and not conceding many.

"But the Liverpool ti-tle-winning side of 1978-79 really turned on the style. That year we scored 85 goals and only let in 16—and we played brilliant football.

"That was the great team. This one isn't there yet, but I'm convinced it will compare with them one day."

Hansen, who has now

won seven championship medals, was a member of that superb 78-79 side

which included such greats as Ray Clemence, Kenny Dalglish, Graeme Souness and Terry McDermott.

Hansen underlined his belief that the present Liverpool team are heading for more glory when he added: "I think this team are going to go from strength to strength.

"Whether I'm a part of it remains to be seen.

I'll be out of the door as soon as they think the time is right because I've seen it happen to so many players before.

"It is the Liverpool way 1 accept 10 Altei you've won something, it counts for nothing because you're expected to start again.

"That's what keeps" you going more than anything here.'

Liverpool, who have ruled English soccer for a quarter of a century, still have a thirst for glory which remains unquenched.
