# LIVERPOOL CLINCH IT!

Bruges 1, Liverpool 1 (Aggregate: 3-4)

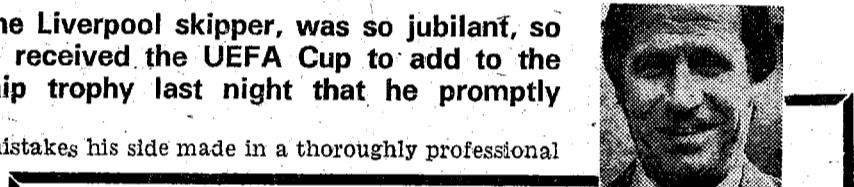
EMLYN HUGHES, the Liverpool skipper, was so jubilant, so triumphant when he received the UEFA Cup to add to the League Championship trophy last night that he promptly dropped it!

It was one of the few mistakes his side made in a thoroughly professional performance that suggests the European Cup itself may not be beyond them next season.

There are not many teams in Europe better equipped than Bruges yet Liverpool, facing a delicate situation with a fragile 3-2 lead from the first leg, dealt with them unhesitatingly, unworriedly as for the second time in three years they completed the League and UEFA Cup double.

### Carnival

Once the tension of the 90 minutes had lifted, it became a night of carnival for Liverpool who swapped shirts with their opponents, danced rather than ran on the lap of honour, and paid a special, moving tribute to their colony of sup-

porters at one end of the ground.

Seldom has a team been more deserving of the honours that have poured on them this season.

Champion of champions, with a record ninth title win, Manager of the Year in Bob Paisley, Player of the Year in Kevin Keegan and five men in the England squad . . . that is the impressive list of qualifications that Liverpool will take with them into the European Cup. All right, so this particular performance was composed rather than colourful, sound instead of spectacular, but some teams might have fumbled when in the disastrous 11th minute

Tommy Smith conceded a penalty by handling the ball and Lambert scored from the spot.

That goal could have been the killer coming as it did so early in the game, and levelling the score on aggregate. Yet Liverpool were far from downhearted. Within five minutes they retrieved an awkward situation by regaining their one-goal lead.

### Foiled

From a free-kick awarded outside the penalty area, Hughes fooled the defensive wall by playing the ball short and square to Keegan, who drilled a right-foot shot unerringly to equalise.

Liverpool could hardly

have had greater encouragement, because this was the first goal Bruges had conceded at home in the UEFA Cup this season.

Liverpool had to keep a close watch on the lively Lambert and Van Gool, but as confidence mounted they played the ball unhurriedly out of defence and constructed attacks expertly as if reminding Bruges that they were not there simply to soak up punishment.

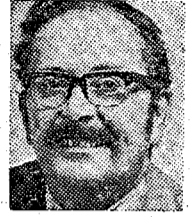
Tommy Smith almost put Liverpool ahead after 34 minutes, when, with the referee ignoring a linesman's flag, he advanced to meet Ray Kennedy's free-kick with

a volley that flew agonisingly wide.

Liverpool almost cracked five minutes into the second half, when a move involving Le Fevre and Van Gool split the defence, leaving Lambert with a vicious shot that beat Clemence but bounced off his left-hand post.

Liverpool lived dangerously but somebody was always there to deal with awkward situations—usually Thompson.

And when the defence was breached four minutes from time, Ray Clemence retrieved his reputation after the error that cost England the match against Scotland with a superb diving save from Cools.

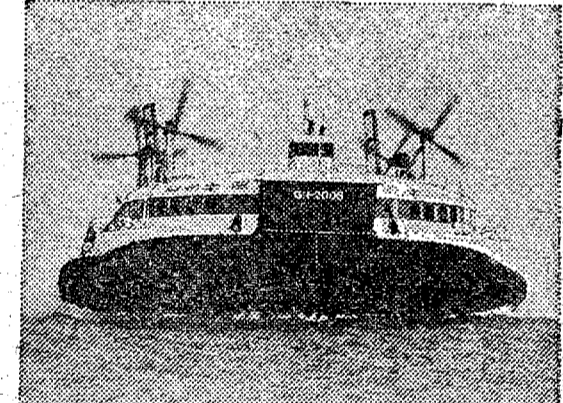
MANCHESTER United defender Brian Greenhoff is going on England's tour of America after all.

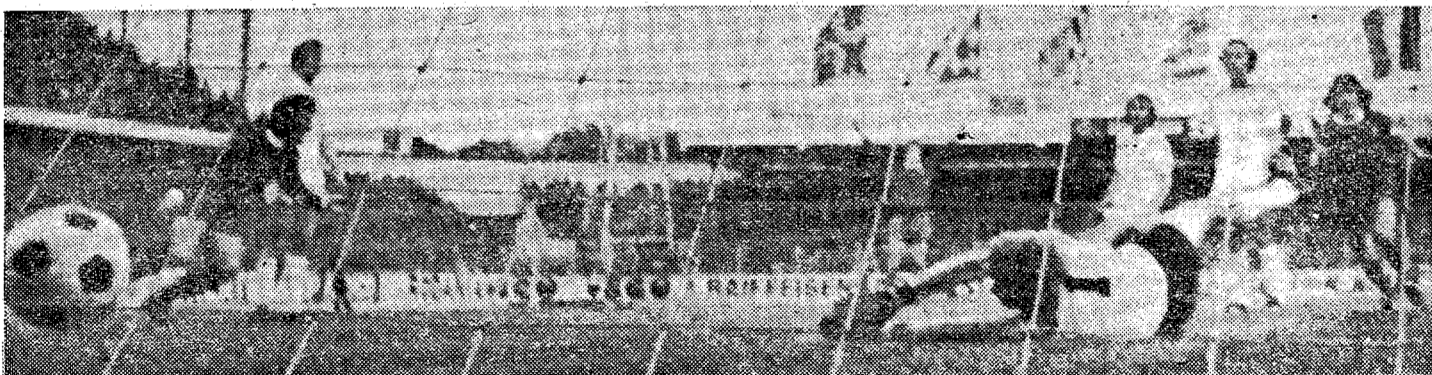
