

Hobbs, a 71-year-old millionaire quarry owner, was voted out in a dramatic boardroom coup by the other four directors. They elected Stephen Kew as the new chair-

man. But Hobbs plans to ask share-

holders to reverse the decision.

"I've known for some time that moves were afoot to get me out and I don't intend to take it lying down," he said.

"Some people don't like me because I've been too forthright. It's the first time in my life I've been demoted."

The move to unseat Hobbs apparently started when he made a public appeal to local business-

men, offering them a seat on the board for £25,000.

"The other directors are afraid that if people do come forward with the money they will lose control of the club," said Hobbs.

TWO special men will remember and treasure this night, this game, this European Cup victory for the rest of their lives.

Tommy Smith and Kevin Keegan were not the only Liverpool heroes of an unforgettable night in Rome's Olympic Stadium. The whole, lovely, lively lot of their players made it happen.

But for me it was the performances of this pair on the last time either will wear their famous red shirts-Smith is retiring and Keegan is leaving —which helps to make the occasion so memorable.
