SOCCER is likely to be rocked by another scan-dal before the end of the season after police investigations into the use of money passed on to clubs for ground improvement.

Three clubs—Aston Villa, Port Vale and Shrewsbury—have been co-operating with the police in their inquiries. And it's probable that charges will be brought soon in connection with a deal involving one club.

The cash comes from the Football Trust, who then pass it on to the Football Ground's Improvement Trust, which is guided by a voluntary panel.

One of the panel's members is all-time great Tom Finney—said to be "disillusioned" by what he's heard.

As a result the Trust is conducting its own inquiries into seven other clubs who have been told by the Foot-ball League to co-operate fully.

Now the Trust proposes to tighten up its supervision over the spending of the money—and is looking into a new problem new problem.

It is unhappy that it

sad lack of Trust

has contributed vast sums to clubs for improvements and training centres only to find that it has been used to benefit individuals not directly controlling those clubs.

It's becoming a worrying practice that directors sell out to a new regime, but keep control of the property through a holding company and then charge rent.

So they profit from the Trust's investment, without being responsible for club debts or supporters, who should be the main beneficiaries of such grants.

Villa and Shrewsbury collected cash to

improve their grounds and for safety measures to be installed to guard against hooliganism. Port Vale received their cash for new floodlighting.

All in all it's a disturbing story. I hope we'll hear all the facts—either through the courts or the Football League.

THE Football League have axed their fixture computer company fol-lowing complaints from several clubs.

And the lucrative contract has been handed to a new company mak-ing its first venture into the world of fixture lists.

Ken Bates, chairman of Chelsea, one of the clubs who have protested, said: "The League admitted they felt the computer hadn't done a good job.

"This year we felt particularly aggrieved at the Christmas and New Year period when we had only one in four matches at home.

"In that time we had away Queen's Park Rangers and then had to visit both Shrewsbury and Leicester over the New Year—which was a diabolical arrangement.

"We missed out altogether on potentially larger holiday games."

Other clubs have complained, too, at having three or more away matches in succession.

Crystal Palace had four games away in eleven days earlier in the season and then five at home in January alone.

All the West London clubs wrote to the Lea-gue, highlighting the gue, highlighting the problems and a League spokesman said: "It is true we have changed companies and we hope it will mean better and fewer fixtures.

"Clubs are making more and more demands over fixtures as they fight against dwindling attendances.

"We went to a couple of companies, and after looking at what they offered—we changed."



Just like home


