ONY COTTEE began the season with a sensational hat-trick after his £2 million move from West Ham to Everton.

Now he's keeping his fingers crossed he will not only finish it with his first full cap for England tomorrow, but another explosion of goals.

Cottee is certain to figure strongly

in manager Bobby Robson's teamplanning as England face Scotland in their Rous Cup match at Hamp-den Park. And he says: "To

be selected for a full game would be a nice end to a difficult season.

"I've been dropped twice by Everton and my six games for Eng-land have all been as a substitute.

"But I tell myself you don't become a bad player overnight and so after two years with the England set-up it's impor-tant to make the final break-through."

Cottee's 18 goals this season is way below the target of 30 he set himself on his Merseyside move.

"When you go around shouting your mouth off about what you are going to do and then don't produce, you have to expect criticism," he explained plained.

"But I'm the kind of player who keeps a scrap book and I analyse every goalscoring opportunity I get.
"It's because I want to be the best. And I'm not at my peak yet and I believe I have another two years of learning before I reach it."

Cottee has been boosted by his appearance in the final 20 minutes against Chile on Tuesday, when he made an immediate impact.

Robson's dilemma is whether to give another chance to John Fashanu and Nigel Clough or put Cottee in for a full game.
