

Schu's kicked out in new row

ICHAEL SCHUMACHER was last night sensationally kicked out of the Belgian Grand Prix after a cheat storm.

And that gave Damon Hill the race and blew the world drivers' championship wide open.

Schumacher and Hill were unaware of the dramatic decision, taken five hours after the finish. Both drivers were in the air heading for home. Schumacher had won comfort-

nad won comfortably – but the race stewards found his Benetton car broke new safety rules brought in after Ayrton Senna's death.

A wooden plank fitted under the car to reduce grip and slow it down for safety was half a millimetre thinner than it should have been. The stewards claimed this

should have been.
The stewards claimed this SCHUMACHER: Disqualified

meant the car ran closer to the ground than it should have done and gave it a better grip than the cars of Hill and the other drivers.

Benetton's technical director Ross Brawn spent several hours arguing that the plank had started the race the same size as the one fitted to team-mate Jos Verstappen's car.

Brawn said Schumacher had had trouble with tyre pressures and that the damage to the plank happened when his car spun over a kerb on lap 19 of the 44-lap race.

But the stewards threw out his plea – and it was yet another black day for championship leader Schumacher and his team.

Hill told IRN after flying back from Belgium last night: "Rules are rules, so that's Michael's tough luck. I needed to win in Spa to stay in contention for the championship.

"Now I've won or, more accurately, been awarded the race. It means the title is wide open again." Schumacher
