

TEARS of joy flowed in the Ataturk stadium last night as Liverpool were crowned European champions with an incredible fightback against AC Milan.

The Reds won a penalty shoot-out after coming back from 3-0 down to draw with three goals in a blistering six minute period that left the Italian giants shell-shocked.

The Anfield faithful went wild with delight when Milan's Andriy Shevchenko fluffed his spot kick to hand the Merseyside club the trophy for the fifth time – meaning they can now keep it.
Yet at half-time, Liverpool looked dead and

buried as Milan tore them apart after taking the lead in the first minute.

But a header from Steven Gerrard started the fightback. Moments later Vladimir Smicer fired in the second and Spaniard Xabi Alonso

equalised from the penalty spot. Fans cheered, wept and sang their hearts out

again as they marched across Europe.

"But after sitting in a traffic jam for two


hours we got off the coach and started walking. Thousands of fans were doing exactly the same, with people panicking they were about to miss the match.
