Sahin delivers for the Kop kids
WEST BROM 1
LIVERPOOL 2

BRENDAN RODGERS may have overseen the worst Liverpool start to a league campaign in a century, but two goals from Nuri Sahin last night rewarded the manager for sticking to his principles.

Two points from the opening five matches in the Premier League could have seen the Liverpool boss adopt a more pragmatic approach for this difficult tie in the Black Country.

But far from sending out some of the big guns in a bid to change his luck, Rodgers fielded a team virtually unrecognisable to those without an intimate knowledge of the club.

And the Northern Irishman was rewarded for his brave and youthful selection eight minutes from time when on-loan Real Madrid midfielder Sahin finished from close range, capping a thoroughly impressive show from Rodgers' rookies.

The victory was all the more impressive because Liverpool had to recover from the shock of losing a third-minute goal to West Brom centre half Gabriel Tamas that was as soft as they come.

But home keeper Ben Foster was culpable in allowing Sahin to equalise shortly afterwards and Liverpoolsettled into the tie, running out worthy winners.

Such has been the emphasis placed on youth and Rodgers' determination to experiment that this third-round clash also saw Jerome Sinclair set a record as the youngest player to wear the club's colours.

Remember the name, because Liverpool's staff don't seem able to do so. Persons unknown filled in the team-sheet beforehand, listing the striker's name as Jordan.

But his introduction in the 81st minute meant Sinclair, aged 16 years and six days, created history.

'It's great to have young players like that,' said Rodgers. 'I think it's a symbol of how we are looking to progress.

'We want to bring in top players but it's equally important for us to develop top players. For me it's about talent -- irrespective of age. We have a very small squad. At the moment, I've got 12 senior players fit. We've had four games in 10 days and we are busy again next week.

'So, young players are going to get their chance, if they have the talent. There's a bright future here. And I think the fans are buying into what we are trying to do.

'It's even more special when you have so many young players against a West Brom side that have had such a fantastic start.'

Rodgers could not avoid a slight hiccup, however, as he referred to record-breaker Sinclair as 'Jermain' in his first post-match interview. After the team-sheet gaffe, you could say the youngster made three names for himself last night.

Rodgers added: 'It was a great moment for him and it was nice when he received a round of applause in the dressing-room afterwards. But it's no good setting the record, the hard work starts here. He wants to learn and he's a good kid.'

The manager was not the only one to slip up last night. Liverpool goalkeeper Jones was at fault after Liam Ridgewell pumped a 40-yard free-kick deep into Liverpool's penalty area. Jones sprinted from his line to take what should have been a routine catch.

However, with West Brom defender Jonas Olsson in pursuit, the Australian dropped the ball. Tamas had an empty net to aim for and duly found it from 12 yards.

As the match progressed, Liverpool enjoyed increasingly more of the ball. They had worked it neatly around the pitch in the 17th minute before Sahin drew them level. The midfielder tried his luck from 30 yards with a low, left-foot drive that did not rise more than a foot above the ground and skidded past Foster.

The keeper did not have a clear view of the shot but the reaction suggested he felt he should have kept it out. Thumping his hand against the turf repeatedly, the ex-England man probably realised at the same time he had given the visitors a confidence boost as well as a way back into the tie.

Jones was properly tested just once more, when he palmed clear a shot from Markus Rosenberg from the edge of the area early in the second half.

At the other end, Daniel Pacheco hit the bar with a cheeky 30-yard lob and Samed Yesil missed two headers. He was a nuisance throughout.

To cap an impressive return following his three-goal thumping on the opening day, Rodgers' substitute Suso set up the outstanding Oussama Assaidi, who crossed for Sahin to sidefoot the winner.

It remained for Rodgers' satisfactory evening to be rounded off with a home tie in the fourth round. It was the one he must have wanted, too: his old club Swansea, at Anfield.

'They are two wonderful clubs with fantastic supporters,' he said. 'To get a home tie is special. For it to be Swansea is extra special.'

Sahin double breathes new life into Liverpool's season

Nuri Sahin struck twice to guide Liverpool into the fourth round of the Capital One Cup last night on a night full of positives for Brendan Rodgers.

His team showed resilience in recovering from Gabriel Tamas' early goal for West Brom. The Liverpoolmanager's decision to bring in Sahin on loan from Real Madrid, calling on his contacts with Jose Mourinho, was vindicated.

Rodgers's inexperienced players refused to be overawed, particularly the 24-year-old Moroccan winger Oussama Assaidi, who was outstanding down the left flank all evening. The Liverpool youngsters impressed, particularly Samed Yesil, while Jerome Sinclair, a fleet-footed striker, rose from the bench to become the youngest player in the club's history at 16 years and six days, obliterating Jack Robinson's 16 years 250 days.

Rodgers will also take great heart from the manner in which his reserves played his way, keeping possession, and from Liverpool supporters repeatedly chanting his name as an experienced West Brom team were overcome.

West Brom had won many friends amongst their visitors with a dignified pre-match tribute to the victims of Hillsborough. Steve Clarke began his programme notes with a salute to the families, expressing his hope they get justice. A mascot accompanied the players on to the pitch, bearing a shirt with the number 96.

After sustained applause from all corners of the Hawthorns, Michael Oliver got the tie under way. Liverpoolendured a wretched start, going behind after only three minutes. When Liam Ridgewell swept over a free-kick from the left, Brad Jones rushed from his line and appeared to have the situation under control. But theLiverpool goalkeeper ran into Romelu Lukaku and Jonas Olsson, dropping the ball invitingly forTamas, who drilled it in.

Liverpool appealed loudly to Oliver for a free-kick for a perceived infringement on Jones, but the referee signalled a goal. West Brom fans chuckled "can we play you every week", remembering their 3-0 opening-day Premier League win over Liverpool. But Rodgers' side hit back.

Sahin began to become involved, dictating moves with that clever left foot from in front of Liverpool's back four. Rodgers's youthful three-man attack started to move with more con-fidence. Assaidi, quickly indicating his promise, went down the left and lifted in a terrific cross that Yesil headed wide, a real waste of a gem of a ball. Increasingly assertive in possession, Liverpool equalised after 17 minutes.

When Andre Wisdom rolled the ball inside from the right to Sahin, the Turkish international nudged it forward before unleashing a low leftfooted shot which should have been comfortably saved by Ben Foster. Suffering one of those aberrations that have scarred his career, Foster allowed the ball to slip between his grasp and his left-hand upright.

West Brom remained dangerous on the counter, particularly when they were able to get Lukaku to run at Jamie Carragher and Sebastian Coates. Lukaku broke clear at one point, bringing a low save from Brad Jones. Yet the force appeared with Liverpool, especially when the ball was at the quick feet of Assaidi, who kept dribbling at Billy Jones, often darting inside to good effect.

Having been slow to get going in the first half, Liverpool were a minute late for the second period but were soon moving forward confidently. Yesil, increasingly influential, fired in a shot that totally bamboozled Foster, rearing up and going over.

Albion responded, charging downfield. Markus Rosenberg turned smarly on the edge of the area but Brad Jones was equal to the shot, saving athletically. The game flowed from end to end, soon Daniel Pacheco examining Foster's reflexes. Clarke tried to force a breakthrough by freshening up his attack. He removed Lukaku and sent on Shane Long. But one familiar theme continued. Assaidi was still running at Billy Jones, winning a free-kick after 73 minutes. When Sahin curled the ball in, Coates snaked out a boot to flick the ball goalwards at speed but Foster saved well.

Sinclair then made history, running on with Suso after 78 minutes. It was Suso who began the move toLiverpool's second, sending Assaidi down the left. The Moroccan's cross was low and hard, fractionally in front of Sinclair but not for Sahin, who swept it into the roof of Foster's net.

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Sahin shows Liverpool a way forward

Still without a win in the Premier League, Brendan Rodgers clearly has some distance to travel in his quest to reshape Liverpool in his own image but that development process perhaps took a significant step forward with a victory that might have piqued his interest in defending the club's possession of the League Cup, particularly now that the draw has given him his old club, Swansea, in the fourth round.

Rodgers, his hand partially forced by injuries but largely because of where his priorities lie, cast aside all of his 11 starters from Sunday's home defeat against Manchester United in favour of most of those who emerged on top in that other unwanted diversion, the Europa League, in Switzerland last week, in that extraordinary tie against Young Boys of Berne.

Even he admitted most neutrals, and perhaps a good few who were not, would have weighed up last night's odds and predicted that the home side, who had beaten a much more experienced Liverpool team in some comfort on the opening day of the Premier League, would come out on top again.

Yet the opposite happened. Steve Clarke's team took an early lead when a mistake by Brad Jones handed Gabriel Tamas an easy goal and might have gone further ahead in a strong opening phase. But Liverpool recovered to draw level and then dominate the remainder of the first half, before withstanding a second wave of pressure at the start of the second period to take charge again, scoring their decisive second goal eight minutes from the end.

The finisher in both instances was the German-born Turkey international Nuri Sahin, signed on a season-long loan from Real Madrid, whose integration into the Liverpool side might have been further advanced by now had he not missed a chunk of pre-season while his future was in the balance.

On only his third appearance, Sahin scored first after 17 minutes, beating Ben Foster from 25 yards at the near post. Always a key figure in linking Liverpool's passing manoeuvres, he already had a claim to be man of the match before he popped up with the winner, steering the ball home from close range on the end of a low cross from Oussama Assaidi.

"He is still getting up to speed," Rodgers said. "It has been difficult for him. He missed a big part of pre-season but he is getting better every day. He has a great football arrogance, the confidence to shoot from distance and the ability as he showed with the second goal to arrive in the box.

"But it was a good team performance. The courage to want the ball was very prominent tonight.

"It is exciting to see young players with great technique but what is important is they know how to fight," Rodgers added. "The second goal in particular showed what we are about."

The reception from the Liverpool fans was certainly in approval. There were three teenagers on at the start with another five on the bench, including Jerome Sinclair, whose appearance in the last 10 minutes made him Liverpool's youngest senior player at 16 years and six days. Where they lacked experience they compensated in fearlessness.

Their spirit was exemplified, as Rodgers said, in the decisive goal. Albion had looked strong enough perhaps to persuade a more conservative approach from Liverpool but then Suso, the Spain Under-19 international Rodgers ushered on at the same time as Sinclair, responded to his first possession by launching a run through the middle that had the home defence back peddling. Intelligently, he slipped the ball wide to Assaidi, in free space, whose cross was perfectly weighted for Sahin to convert and send Liverpool onwards.

Fightback means it's nappy days for Brendan's Babes

Brendan Rodgers challenged Liverpool to retain the League Cup and Jerome Sinclair to continue to make history after this promising win.

Rodgers inherited the Carling Cup in the Anfield trophy room after succeeding Kenny Dalglish this summer.

And the new Liverpool boss has no plans to give up the trophy easily after his new-look side put up a real fight at The Hawthorns.

Rodgers must have feared the worst when the visitors fell behind to Gabriel Tamas' third minute goal.

It was a nightmare start for the Reds as keeper Brad Jones failed to hold Liam Ridgeway's outswinging free-kick.

But the visitors responded strongly with goals in either half from new midfielder Nuri Sahin, on loan from Real Madrid.

As well as the win, the manner of their slick, enterprising football delighted Rodgers, whose side are in the top-flight bottom three.

And after giving Raheem Sterling his chance to shine in the top-flight, sub Sinclair is now Liverpool's youngest player aged 16 years, six days.

Rodgers revealed: "I said to the players afterwards that the League Cup is stored an Anfield.

"I don't want us to give it up too easily. It is a competition we want to do well in. I want us to fight.

"This is one of the iconic clubs in world football, but we are not at that level as a team.

"The fans can see we are working hard to get back there though.

"The Liverpool supporters are very educated and clever. The support they have given the team and myself has been incredible.

"And whether it is a young player or a senior player, all players want to do is play football. I try to build a framework for them to have the confidence to go and play.

"Certainly tonight, in particularly with the young players, they were outstanding."

Rodgers' faith in youth meant even at 1-1 with the tie heading to extra-time, he was bold enough to throw on Suso and Sinclair in a double substitution in the 81st minute.

Just 60 seconds later, the Reds had taken the lead when outstanding winger Oussama Assaidi crossed for Sahin to net.

Turkish midfielder Sahin had earlier struck from distance in the 17th minute as keeper Ben Foster was also at fault at the other end.

Sahin then won it late on despite the moans of Baggies boss Steve Clarke who felt the goal was offside.

Rodgers was thrilled for his entire side and especially Sinclair who now replaces Jack Robinson in the Anfield history books.

Rodgers added: "He got a nice round of applause afterwards in the dressing room but now his hard work begins.

"It is no good being the youngest player and then drifting out.

"But fortunately he is a focused kid and has good concentration. He wants to learn and once you have that hunger to learn it can take you a long way."

The Reds' win ensured quick revenge after they lost 3-0 at Albion on the opening day of the League campaign.

Now Liverpool must look to reproduce another decent display on Saturday at struggling Norwich.

Rodgers made 11 changes to the side which lost at United at the weekend.

It meant an exciting glimpse of the future for the sold-out away section, who sung Rodgers' name loudly.

With new winger Assaidi wrecking havoc on the left flank, Liverpool were always a threat.

Daniel Pacheco also hit the bar after the break and forced Foster into a good save.

While Foster had to make a good save from Sebastian Coates' header which atoned for his earlier blunder on an indifferent night for the shot-stopper.

Albion had their chances but neither new signing Markus Rosenberg or in-form Romelu Lukaku managed to take them.

Baggies boss Clarke named a strong side against his old club but Liverpool's youthful enthusiasm and skill prevailed.

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THE defence of the League Cup could prove to be a thrilling case of trial and error. If tonight at the Hawthorns, Liverpool showed us how they intend to go on in the Capital One Cup then these games could provide an outlet of excitement whilst progress in the league remains a more stubborn foe. Manager Brendan Rodgers has to rotate his squad in order to keep his side as competitive as possible on all fronts this season, so his trust is placed in those of potential and promise. The historic debut of Jerome Sinclair, a late replacement to become the youngest player to play for the club at 16 years and six days, only emphasised the point. This group may ultimately lack the cunning and know-how to navigate a return to Wembley, but the manner in which they responded to going a goal behind at West Bromwich Albion says this Liverpool selection will attack the task. Barring the one of two players who still have hefty price tags to justify, the team which saw off the Baggies played free from the shackles of pressure and close scrutiny. And Rodgers used that to encourage their flair, confidence in possession and willing to experiment. It is a freedom that eventually the manager hopes Liverpool's strongest side will play with. For now, the taster sessions come in midweek, in the Capital One Cup and Europa League. A first goal for the club from the on-loan Nuri Sahin brought Liverpool level after Brad Jones' error gifted West Brom an early opener. The equalising goal allowed Rodgers' men to go forward with intent though their control of the game was not rewarded until eight minutes from time when Sahin scored his second, booking Liverpool into the fourth round. Last season's cup run eased Liverpool in before the challenges stiffened as the rounds progressed. Unfortunately for Rodgers, his opening two months of competitive action have rarely allowed him a gentle ride or the rub of the green. After last season's opening tie in the League Cup at Exeter City, Liverpool faced a far sterner test this time around as West Brom were plucked out of the hat. A trip to the West Midlands was made all the more undesirable given the side's chastening experience on the opening day. Fortunately perhaps, the side which played out last night's third round tie at the Hawthorns, had been spared the nightmare of August's 3-0 defeat. The necessity to carefully balance the demands on his limited number of senior players – as much as Rodgers' desire to nurture players from within the club's Academy – shaped his team sheet. Only Stewart Downing and Jamie Carragher featured in the opening game of the Premier League season and even they have found themselves increasingly reserved for the cup nights. And with the exception of two changes, this was the 11 who started the up and down thriller against Young Boys six days earlier in the Europa League. Though Liverpool lacked experience in most areas, they had least had the element of surprise and the fearless nature of youth about them. It is such qualities Rodgers needs to rely upon as he juggles Liverpool on four fronts in this season of transition, where improvements in the league remain the priority. The travelling supporters were given a first look at Samed Yesil, the 18-year-old signed from Bayer Leverkusen, as well other unfamiliar faces such as Oussama Assaidi and Sahin. Liverpool's substitutes' bench was even more of a window into the future. But Liverpool in the here and now are of the greater concern and the soft manner in which they conceded after three minutes did not make for pleasant viewing. Brad Jones dropped the ball from Liam Ridgeway's free-kick into the area and from the spoils, Gabriel Tamas capitalised by firing into the unguarded net. West Brom immediately had their tails up, Romelu Lakaku took little time in finding his appetite for the game and Jones was again in the thick of it, saving low at his near post from Markus Rosenberg's drive. But the inclusion of fresh blood and thinking into this team helped show the Liverpool supporters some shoots of recovery. Assaidi's jinking run and cross found Yesil whose header glanced marginally wide of the goal in a move which pleased the manager. Liverpool by now had settled and found a degree of momentum, yet they were indebted to some welcome fortune for their equaliser. Sahin struck well from 30 yards but where Ben Foster looked certain to palm away to safety, the West Brom goalkeeper instead allowed the strike to slip through his guard and into the net. Naturally, the goal gave Rodgers' men confidence and impetus with much of their improved work came down the left flank through Assaidi. Sahin too, provided the midfield with rhythm and though not every pass came off, in the main he kept Liverpool moving in the first half. Defensively, he also deserves credit. West Brom rallied as the break approached but it was Liverpool who had controlled the game for longer spells. And the visitors picked up where they left off with a blistering start to the second half. Yesil troubled a nervous Foster from the edge of the area, with the keeper relieved to see the shot ricochet over the bar. Foster could only watch Daniel Pacheco's effort as it sailed over his head but on to the top of the bar. At the other end, Jones had to remain alert to keep out Rosenberg's strike from the edge of the area before his opposite number again looked uncomfortable dealing with a Liverpool shot from range. Though, it must be said that Foster showed greater composure when saving at close range from Sebastian Coates' effort with 15 minutes remaining. But there was nothing Foster could do about Sahin's strike, eight minutes from time.



A flowing move found Assaidi wide on the left and his low cross found Sahin who strode onto the ball and converted from six yards. It was a move to reinforce that Liverpool's fourth round tie could be one worth watching. THAT CUP run, so desperately sought by West Bromwich Albion, will have to wait until January at least. Albion fell to a late Nuri Sahin goal to end their Capital One Cup ambitions. Yet it had looked so promising early on when Gabriel Tamas pounced onto a Brad Jones error. It certainly wasn't to be a vintage night for goalkeepers. Ben Foster made a rare slip when he allowed Sahin's long-range shot to slip underneath him. The equaliser transformed the landscape of the game. Liverpool's young side – orchestrated from midfield by the brilliant Sahin – were to grow in confidence against an Albion side which boasted more experience and, on paper certainly, more pedigree. And Brendan Rodgers was to be handed his first competitive domestic victory thanks to Sahin's close effort during the close stages. Steve Clarke picked a strong side Albion side – certainly one which gave few clues to a slump in momentum during the first half. Liverpool's side smacked of priorities being elsewhere. And it showed. Within three minutes Albion were ahead. Liverpool conceded a free-kick on their right-hand side. Liam Ridgeway's set-piece floated into the box and should have been easily taken by Brad Jones. The Liverpool keeper spilled the ball, allowing Gabriel Tamas to drive a shot into the unguarded net. The lead could have been doubled minutes later when Romelu Lukaku left Jamie Carragher on his backside. He sent in a low ball for Markus Rosenberg, whose low shot was saved by the foot of Jones. In the 17th minute it was 1-1. Andre Wisdom fed Sahin some 30 yards out. The Reds midfielder let fly with a shot that Foster should have saved but allowed to slip underneath his body. It got worse for Albion when Ridgeway's night ended early. The Albion left-back was forced off after suffering an injury in the build up to the goal. Craig Dawson came on in his place and Billy Jones moved over to left-back, leaving Dawson to deal with speedy left-wing nuisance Assaidi. Albion's spirited start floundered. The midfield lacked ingenuity and tempo with Sahin directing the play around him. Liverpool threatened after the break. Yesil's 50th minute shot was beaten into the ground by Foster. The ball bounced down and over the bar. It was a nervous moment from the Albion goalkeeper. The Reds weren't finished. Moments later Daniel Pacheco dipping curler had Foster beaten but not his goal. The ball bounced onto the bar and out of play. At the other end Rosenberg was having one of those days, it seemed. A long range effort opportunity came his way. His shot was nearer to troubling the corner flag than Jones' goal. But the Swedish striker was unlucky in the 56th minute. Again from close range, he despatched a powerful shot – this time it flew towards the top corner and Jones had to react quickly. Foster did well to deny Coates in the 71st minute as the visitors piled forward. A free-kick came in, Coates steered it goalbound but Foster reacted sharply. But there was little he could do about Liverpool's winner. Assaidi was fed by substitute Suso. The ball came across the box and was turned into the goal by Sahin to hand Liverpool an 82nd minute lead. There was still time for Marc-Antoine Fortuné to go close with a vicious volley from Olsson's chip.
