Rodgers needs spark

Newcastle United Perez 73 1 Liverpool 0 Referee AMARRINER Attendance 52,166 Brendan Rodgers reeled off the statistics, the numbers which demonstrate why Liverpool are where they are and not where they were. "It's not rocket science," he said and yet there are times when football feels like one of the more obscure branches of applied mathematics, like quantum physics with a dash of perversity, when problems are simple to identify and solutions lie in the millimetres beyond a manager's reach.

Rodgers was speaking in a corridor inside St James' Park; by that time the stadium had just about stopped bouncing. Newcastle United had won their fourth consecutive match in the space of 15 unfathomable days, during which a plot-line has been shredded and a narrative altered beyond comprehension, when a club has turned in on itself and discovered something fundamental in the process. Liverpool could do with a dollop of the unknown. "You're always analysing, but I don't think it's about stripping it down and starting again with ourselves," Rodgers said. "It is fairly straightforward and easy for me to see why the performances haven't been so fluent. We have lost goals. We scored 101 goals last year in a team that had been working towards that. Take away nearly 80 per cent of that and it can become difficult for you, alongside the introduction of lots of new players."

The dissection was not unreasonable -- Luis Suarez is irreplaceable and Daniel Sturridge missed keenly -- but it was also incomplete. There have only been two clean sheets in their 15 matches in all competitions and pitiful defending was again a feature of their visit to Tyneside, but the frailty feels more amorphous than that. Something is missing. A spark.

Newcastle now have it. In their previous home fixture they narrowly prevailed over Leicester City, but the relief that accompanied their 1-0 victory was nauseous; it mattered too much to be enjoyed. Since then they have won at Tottenham Hotspur and tore at Manchester City in the Capital One Cup victory and while drama and delicacy were rationed on Saturday, they played with vigour and energy.

The contrast is remarkable and although difficulty encouraged Alan Pardew to isolate each game, to strip things back to basics and grow spirit among his team, there is little logic to it. A few weeks ago, it would have been risible to suggest that Gabriel Obertan, Mehdi Abeid and Sammy Ameobi would start this match, that a cast of misfits would become pivotal, but momentum has bred something at Newcastle.

Liverpool had a surfeit of it last season, but all Rodgers can offer is a doubling of effort. They must wade through the mediocrity and wait. "For us, it has been a difficult start," he said. "Not ideal. We can only continue to work well, that's all you can do. If you work hard it gives you extra confidence and ultimately confidence will then bring you success. It is certainly something we will strive towards."

Their games this week against Real Madrid and Chelsea feel unforgiving, but Newcastle have shown how swiftly the mood can switch. "It is why we worked so hard," Rodgers said. "We wanted to be involved in this type of game [against Real Madrid] because it means we've been successful. It has been a steep learning curve this season, with the games and the new players, but we will be better because of it. The wee bit of adversity you go through makes you stronger when you come out of the other end."

By that reasoning, Pardew should be indestructible although he will know by now that Newcastle being Newcastle, mishap is never banished but deferred. He is not yet in a position to luxuriate but an "unbelievable" spell has restored a sense of purpose to a club which was haemorrhaging love. His young players have set a standard and instead recoiling from discontent, the 53-yearold now has positivity to harness

Pardew shows Rodgers all is not lost as he continues his journey back from the dead

Brendan Rodgers spoke convincingly about "adversity making you stronger" but the Liverpool manager's tense body language belied the fluency of his sentences. As he patiently discussed "steep learning curves" and Raheem Sterling's "very quiet" performance, the flatness in Rodgers' voice and the disappointment in his eyes appeared to betray inner doubts. This, it seemed, was a man in urgent need of a restorative glass of wine with an old friend and mentor. Happily, Alan Pardew was on hand to reassure his one time youth coach at Reading that there really is truth in cliches. If Rodgers required proof, he needed to glance no further than Newcastle United's manager.

Barely a fortnight ago Liverpool's struggle to adapt to life after Luis Suarez looked almost trivial compared with the crisis unfolding on Tyneside. Pardew's sacking was deemed a case of "when, not if", a relegation skirmish apparently loomed and the players were widely dismissed as inadequate. Four consecutive wins later Newcastle's manager smiled as a fan dressed as a skeleton and wearing a Halloween mask stood behind the home dug-out waving a placard bearing the message "Pardew - Back From The Dead". Out on the pitch, his team greeted the final whistle with a spontaneous group hug.

It is amazing what a makeover can do. In Newcastle's case this has involved Pardew ditching the unflattering 4-2-3-1 formation, which worked really only when Yohan Cabaye was still around, and replacing it with a better balanced 4-3-3

Now Newcastle are able to show off their strong points, most notably formidable counter-attacking pace. Moussa Sissoko's redeployment in a much deeper, more central, midfield role has also helped, leaving the powerful France midfielder looking a player reborn at the heart of a team in which competition for places is suddenly intense.

Peter Beardsley's promotion to development team manager has coincided with the emergence of a string of youngsters clearly well prepared for first XI duties. On Saturday it was hard to believe Mehdi Abeid was making his Premier League debut. Excellent alongside Sissoko in midfield, Abeid proved a man of the match contender on a day when Pardew's three substitutes - Rolando Aarons, Remy Cabella and Ayoze Perez - all asked questions Liverpool struggled to answer. Perez, 21, and a pounds 1.5m summer signing from Tenerife, was supposed to spend most of this season being polished by Beardsley but instead scored his second league goal in six days.

He hooked the ball beyond Simon Mignolet at the end of a jet-heeled break featuring a slick one-two involving Paul Dummett and Sissoko and an awful defensive mistake on Alberto Moreno's part.

Suffocated by Newcastle's assiduous closing down and deep defending but increasingly frightened of their counter-attacking acceleration, Liverpool were unrecognisable from last season's title challengers. They are not in great shape for tomorrow's daunting Champions League trip to Real Madrid. Mario Balotelli's principal contribution was offering Glen Johnson an animated tactical lecture during an interruption in play but it was not the isolated Italian's fault that Dummett marked Sterling out of the game. Or that Philippe Coutinho's passing radar proved horribly awry.

With Steven Taylor and Fabricio Coloccini excelling in defence, Liverpool created only two chances - a Martin Skrtel header directed narrowly wide from Steven Gerrard's corner and a Coutinho header well saved by Tim Krul following Gerrard's cross.

In Daniel Sturridge's continued absence through injury Rodgers could surely do worse than experiment with pairing Balotelli alongside his compatriot, Fabio Borini. Liverpool's attacking menace increased after he finally stepped off the bench. "We've lost goals," acknowledged Rodgers. "We scored 101 last season. Take away nearly 80% of that [Suarez and Sturridge], introduce lots of new players and it can become difficult. But the wee bit of adversity you go through makes you stronger when you come out the other end."

We must not lose talisman Stevie, insists Rodgers NEWCASTLE 1 LIVERPOOL 0

BRENDAN Rodgers insists sentiment has no bearing on his determination to see Steven Gerrard be given a contract extension.

Liverpool's captain, who is out of contract next June, raised the prospect that he could play somewhere else next season, after he revealed in an interview with Sportsmail last week that he had yet to be offered a new deal and has no plans to retire.

That statement pricked the ears of several managers, notably Manchester City's Manuel Pellegrini, who admitted he would certainly consider a move for the 34-year-old, as he believes Gerrard has the quality to 'continue at a high level for a couple more years'.

Crucially, though, so does Rodgers and he explained that his motives for wanting to keep Gerrard as the heart of his team have got nothing to do with the fact he has been at the club all his life or because he has a strong relationship with him. Rodgers has held initial discussions with Gerrard's representatives and has recommended to Fenway Sports Group, the club's American owners, that his terms be renewed. Liverpool hope to have the matter concluded swiftly once formal talks begin.

'It is certainly not sentimental,' said Rodgers. 'As the manager of this club, you can't afford to do that. I look at his contribution since I've been here. I came here two-and-ahalf years ago when Steven was 32, had struggled with injury and hadn't played consistently over a number of years. I came in, sold him the idea and the philosophy of how we wanted to work and his importance to it. In that period, he has been outstanding. Maybe the team hasn't played so well this year - and maybe there is a focus on Steven -- but he's been brilliant for me.

'Both on and off the field, as a leader and a captain, and I want to ensure that on this second curve we're on, in terms of the development of this group, he is very much a part of that. So there is certainly no sentiment involved in it.

'When you see some of his passes and his influence in the changing room, he is still an outstanding player. He is the perfect example for a lot of our players to learn from.' Gerrard was the only Liverpool player who looked capable of making anything happen at St James' Park on Saturday. Too many of his colleagues failed to impose themselves on a drab contest from which Newcastle managed to chisel a 1-0 win thanks to Avoze Perez's goal.

Liverpool's form has been wretched and since the start of September, they have floundered in the Premier League, winning just two of their seven assignments. Tomorrow they face a huge task in Madrid against Champions League holders Real.

A showdown with Chelsea at Anfield then awaits next Saturday and with no momentum behind them, few will give Liverpool a chance of taking anything from either assignment.

Rodgers, though, is refusing to grumble. 'It is why we worked so hard,' said Rodgers. 'We wanted to be involved in this type of game, [against Real Madrid], because it means we've been successful.

Gerrard is key to our future, insists Rodgers; Liverpool need captain to stay 'for football reasons'; Newcastle hero Perez is hailed after 1–0 victory

Brendan Rodgers, the Liverpool manager, says his determination to extend Steven Gerrard's contract is solely down to the player's talent and nothing to do with sentimentality.

Rodgers wants Gerrard to remain beyond this season – the captain's contract expires in July – and has made his feeling known to the Anfield hierarchy. Both manager and player would like the issue resolved because Gerrard could sign a pre– contract agreement to move at the end of his current deal as early as Jan 1.

"It is certainly not sentimental," Rodgers said. "As the manager of this club you can't afford to do that.

"Look at his contribution in the two years that I've been here. Steven was 32, had struggled with injury, hadn't played consistently over a number of years, and I came in, sold him the idea and the philosophy of how we wanted to work and his importance to it. In that period, he has been absolutely outstanding and of course maybe the team hasn't played so well this year, and maybe there's a focus on Steven, but he's been absolutely brilliant for me.

"Both on and off the field, as a leader and a captain and I want to ensure that on this second curve we're on, in terms of the development of this group, he is very much a part of that. So there is certainly no sentiment involved in it. When you see his influence in the changing room, he is still an outstanding player.

"He will be 35 at the end of the season but he is still fresh and he still looks after himself very well. Technically he is a big player for us. He is the perfect sort of example for a lot of our players to learn from."

Liverpool head to Madrid today for their latest Champions League match, and Rodgers says his lack of firepower is making it harder to gain any momentum. They have lost four Premier League games and trail the leaders by 12 points. "It is fairly straightforward for me to see why the performances haven't been so fluent. We have lost goals," the manager said, comparing their problems to last season's performance in the Premier League.

"We scored 101 goals last year. Tim Krul, meanwhile, has hailed Ayoze Perez after the Spaniard was Newcastle United's match– winner for the second successive week. The former Tenerife youngster scored the winner against Tottenham Hotspur at White Hart Lane a week ago and followed that up with an instinctive finish in the 1–0 win against Liverpool at St James' Park on Saturday.

Krul said Perez, 21, was a special talent. "He's the top striker in the league at the moment with that [goal–scoring] ratio," the Newcastle goalkeeper said. "He's a quality player. He's shown it from the moment he arrived. We knew he was going to be a top player. He's still young and he still has to learn a lot but he's got a great, great future."

Newcastle have now won three league games in succession. Alan Pardew, the manager, said: "It's been an unbelievable spell for us. The basis of what we have done is great defence, a good goalie, not letting teams hurt us and having pace in the team."

Luis Suarez, scorer of 33 goals in 39 appearances last season; sold, Daniel Sturridge, scorer of 28 goals in 42 games last season: injured since August and out for at least three more games. The SAS strike force has been broken up.

"We have lost goals," said Rodgers. "We scored 101 last year but take away nearly 80 per cent of that [Suarez and Sturridge] and it can become difficult, alongside the introduction of lots of new players. It is not rocket science.

After 10 league games last season Liverpool, on their way to a title challenge and second place, had won six and lost two, scoring 17 goals.

It is four wins and four defeats in the league this time round at the 10-game stage, when most bosses say they get a feel for what kind of season it is going to be. Not an alarming dip, but not great considering the Reds' near-perfect run from January last season. A repeat topfour finish looks a distant dream.

The magic to unpick organised defences is not there, and they can't always rely on teenager Raheem Sterling for inspiration. Philippe Coutinho was neat, but without impact. Mario Balotelli was made to look ordinary by Fabricio Coloccini.

Rodgers (right) said: "It has been a difficult start, not ideal. We can only continue to work well, that's all you can do. If you work hard it gives you extra confidence, and ultimately confidence will then bring you success. It is certainly something we

Some unlikely heroes have stepped up. Mehdi Abeid brilliant in midfield, Sammv Ameobi and his impressive work-rate, Paul Dummett excellent, Steven Taylor back with a bang. And none more unlikely than Ayoze Perez, last season's leading scorer in the Spanish second division.

He got his second of the week, and looks a PS1.5million bargain. He said: "It is a dream come true for me. To make the jump from a team like Tenerife to playing in the Premier League is incredible really. It is something that I always wanted to

"It definitely helps having so many young players around me and that has made it easier for me to settle in. To be around other players who are trying to break into the team as well helps you feel more confident that you can do it yourself.

"Fabricio Coloccini has been a massive help to me. He has tried to look after me and I can only thank him for his support. There was a lot of interest in me from some very important teams, but I always knew that Newcastle would be the right move and the last few results have just proved that. I know I made the right decision and I am very happy here."

A "Pardew Back From The Dead" banner was held up at full time, and the black humour was not lost on the man himself.

"It is Halloween." said Pardew. "Bobby Robson had some dark days here. If you are Newcastle manager, it is not all gin and tonics. There will be rough days. I always knew and what I kept saying is that we have a good spirit and talent.

"When it does not go well they let you know and when it is going well, they let you know. You take the good with the bad.

"We have had a long four years, but I have always enjoyed it here. I would like to think I am coming out of this a better manager. It has been interesting and educational. It tests you, this football club, on a number of levels.' For Brendan Rodgers, there may still be some testing times ahead.

Limp Reds crash to fourth Premier League defeat of season
An Alberto Moreno mistake cost Liverpool FC dearly at Newcastle as the Spanish
full-back's hesitancy at the back condemned the Reds to a fourth Premier League
defeat of what has so far been a stop-start season.

It took until Boxing Day for Brendan Rodgers side to lose this many games last term but they succumbed to resurgent Newcastle when substitute Ayoze Perez pounced to punish Moreno who should have cleared his lines.

After beating Swansea City 2-1 in the Capital One Cup in midweek with a much-changed line-up, Rodgers selected a more familiar side for the trip to St James' Park with three alterations from the side that started the last Premier League match at home to Hull City as Glen Johnson, Jordan Henderson and Philippe Coutinho came in for Javier Manquillo, Emre Can and Adam Lallana. Buoyed by three victories on the spin – including away successes at Tottenham

and Premier League champions Manchester City who were dumped out of the Capital One Cup they also won last season – resurgent Newcastle started energetically. Steven Gerrard, was restored to the starting line-up after a rest in midweek for his first appearance since he declared that he might haver to look elsewhere next season to continue his career if no new contract offer from the club is forthcoming. There was a tough moment for the veteran Reds skipper early on when Sammy Ameobi showed him a clean pair of heels but Martin Skrtel was on hand to snuff out the danger. A clumsy challenge in his own area from Joe Allen on Moussa Sissoko also had the home fans on their feet but referee Andre Marriner was not interested in their penalty shouts.

The home side's rhythm was disrupted on 24 minutes when flying winger Gabriel Obertan pulled up with a hamstring injury just as Dejan Lovren was about to steam in as he attempted to sprint on to a pass. It was obvious that the Frenchman's afternoon was coming to an early close and he was replaced by Rolando Aarons. As the first half drew to a close neither keeper had still yet to make a save but Johnson was forced to head a goal-bound shot from Papiss Cisse off the line from Jack Colback's right-wing corner-kick.

Liverpool then had their first clear opening five minutes before the interval as nobody picked up Martin Skrtel from Gerrard's right-wing corner-kick but despite making contact in powerful fashion the Slovakian - who was the top-scoring defender in the Premier League last season but has yet to open his account this term – headed wide of Tim Krul's left-hand post. To add to his woes Skrtel was booked for chopping down Moussa Sissoko soon after but further damager was avoided when Cisse's free-kick, just outside the area and in a central position, sailed high over the bar. Despite the early kick-off, Newcastle's northerly position meant that the floodlights were on as the second half started and the hosts remerged without Cisse who was withdrawn for Ayoze Perez.

Liverpool's first shot on target came courtesy of a set-piece as Sissoko seemingly took out his frustrations over Skrtel on the less intimidating figure of Joe Allen and raked the Welsh midfielder down 25 yards from goal. From the resultant free-kick Mario Balotelli forced Krul into his first save but it was ultimately a routine catch for the Dutchman. The Italian also had another chance soon after when picked out by Raheem Sterling but again his curling effort provided a comfortable enough take for Krul. With the Reds improving, a more athletic stop was required from the home keeper as Gerrard curled in a perfectly-struck inviting right-wing cross for Coutnho and Krul had to be at his best to palm the little Brazilian's header away. Sensing an opportunity to press for a victory. Rodgers withdrew Allen midway through the second half and introduced Fabio Borini into the fray to provide an extra attacking option. It was Newcastle's striking substitute that made the breakthrough though as Perez put the hosts ahead on 73 minutes after some hesitant defending from Liverpool. Left-back Paul Dummett broke clear down the left and picked out Sissoko who calmly squared the ball into the danger zone. At this point Alberto Moreno still appeared favourite to snuff out the chance but the Spaniard dallied on the ball and allowed Perez to sneak in and poke past Mignolet. With the Reds swaying at the back, Newcastle almost added a second a minute later as Perez broke clear with fellow substitute Remy Cabella whose low effort was turned around the post by Mignolet's foot. The Belgian was being kept increasingly busy and also had to be alert to smoother the ball from Sissoko's feet as the home side started to turn the screw but in the end with Liverpool's attack

looking toothless the single goal was enough.

IT was only one letter, but it neatly encapsulated the radical transformation inNewcastle United's fortunes over the course of the last month.

Since the earliest weeks of the season, supporters at St James' Park have been brandishing banners and posters urging Mike Ashley and the rest of the board to "Sack Pardew". On Saturday, as the Magpies beat Liverpool to rack up their fourth win in a row in all competitions, a different message emerged on a flag that was unfurled in the East Stand. This one called for the club's rulers to "Back

Pardew" instead. Shortly after the full-time whistle, a spectator dressed as the Grim Reaper delivered his own message behind the dug-out that had housed Newcastle's previously embattled boss moments earlier. It proclaimed that Pardew was "Back from the Dead", and seemed perfectly in keeping with the narrative of a club that has cornered the market in black comedy in recent years. On Halloween weekend, Newcastle finally shelved their fondness for a horror show. A season that was rapidly spiralling into crisis suddenly appears reborn. "If you are Newcastle manager, it is not all gin and tonics and aperitifs," said Pardew, after Ayoze Perez's second-half strike ensured the momentum generated by wins over Leicester, Tottenham and Manchester City did not dissipate at the hands of Liverpool, a club that has inflicted some damaging blows to the Magpies down the years. "There will be rough days. "I always knew that, but I've always said that we have a good spirit and good talent. I'm not saying I saw the wins coming, but I knew the talent was there. "It will be fantastic in the town now and I might even go in myself, the first time for a while. That is what this city is about - it loves its football. When it does not go well, they let you know, and when it is going well. they let you know that too. You take the good with the bad.

"We've had a long four years. We've had some success, and some of that gets forgotten, but I've always enjoyed it here. I would like to think I'm coming out of this a better manager. It has been interesting and educational. It tests you, this football club, on a number of levels." Having been forced to take the criticism when things were not going well in the early stages of the season, it is only fair that Pardew, who has never lost the support or respect of his players despite all the abuse that was hurled in his direction, receives recognition for his role in turning things around. The has been an element of serendipity in the changes to personnel and formation that have helped haul Newcastle out of the hole they were inhabiting as recently as three weeks ago – the absence of Mike Williamson, Cheick Tiote and Papiss Cisse through injury has forced Pardew to look elsewhere within his squad – but the Magpies manager still deserves praise for the alterations that have sparked Newcastle back into life.

The decision to drop, at various stages, Vurnon Anita, Remy Cabella, Yoan Gouffran and Emmanuel Riviere was bold but undoubtedly necessary. In their wake, Mehdi Abeid, Sammy Ameobi, Gabriel Obertan, Rolando Aarons and Perez have emerged to play crucial roles in the last four wins. None would really have been regarded as first-team candidates at the start of the season; all have proved considerably more effective than the players they replaced.

Suddenly, Newcastle boast youthful exuberance, and pace and unpredictability in attack, assets that have enabled them to outperform Tottenham, Manchester City and Liverpool in the space of a week, all sides with aspirations of competing in next season's Champions League. Abeid, whose Newcastle career looked to be over when he was cast away to Greek side Panathinaikos on loan last season, has been a revelation in the last two matches, with his boundless energy and crisp tackling enabling him to eclipse first Yaya Toure and then Steven Gerrard in the space of four days. If you're going to take midfield scalps as an emerging 22-yearold, you might as well make them two of the best players the Premier League has Further forward, Obertan, whose recent renaissance was cruelly cut short by a thigh injury at the weekend, and Ameobi and Aarons, whose speed and direct attacking style has helped transform the nature of Newcastle's attacking, have significantly increased the threat of a side that struggled to create chances in the opening two months of the season. Then there is Perez, whose £1.8m move from Tenerife was one of the least-heralded of Newcastle's summer transfer moves, but whose potential was underlined by the awards he won in his homeland last week and whose goals against Tottenham and Liverpool have highlighted a predatory instinct possessed by all good centre-forwards. "I am encouraged by the players and what I see," said Pardew. "We have a great balance. We have some good young players, and we feel kind of excited in the dressing room. But we have to deliver." A squad that looked bereft of options at the start of the season, particularly in attack and defence, suddenly looks to be brimming with possibilities. Notably, a number of those possibilities revolve around the presence of homegrown players, and if anything is to repair Pardew's fractured relationship with the supporters and grant him some leeway if things go

It is a long time since Newcastle have boasted a core of local talent the fans are proud to call their own, but of the 14 players involved in Saturday's game, three were born or raised in Newcastle – Ameobi, Paul Dummett and Steven Taylor – and a further three were products of the academy – Abeid, Aarons and Tim Krul. Another, Jack Colback, was raised as a Newcastle fan. All were influential against a bitterly disappointing Liverpool, with Colback delivering the corner that enabled Papiss Cisse to fashion the best chance of the first half, a shot that Glen Johnson headed away from the line.

Martin Skrtel missed a golden opportunity at the other end shortly after, heading wide from eight yards, but neither goalkeeper had really been tested before Perez settled things with 17 minutes left.

Alberto Moreno made a complete hash of attempting to control Moussa Sissoko's square ball across the area, and Perez swooped to drill home.

There should have been a second goal when Cabella failed to beat Simon

Mignolet despite finding himself clean through after a slick one-two with Perez, but Liverpool's all-round impotence meant Newcastle's victory was never in doubt once the deadlock had been broken.

Joy for Pardew, grim for Rodgers

The Grim Reaper was laughing. In the crazy world of Newcastle United, not much makes sense. There were actually two of them, holding a board that declared Alan Pardew had come back from the dead. They had a point. At full-time, 5t James' Park was unrecognisable from earlier this season, when a fractured stadium saw pockets of fans hold SackPardew.com placards. Yesterday it was about gallows humour at Gallowgate. Newcastle, like Pardew, are back from the dead after a display that capped off a quite remarkable week, even by their standards. At half-time at White Hart Lane last Sunday, the walls were caving in. The team trailed to Tottenham, but the manner was causing as much consternation. Since then, in the space of seven days, a football resurrection has followed. Newcastle dragged themselves out of the mire at Spurs to win. They produced a stunning victory at Manchester City in the Capital One Cup on Wednesday and yesterday, against Liverpool, a team on their knees earlier this season were winning key battles all over the St James' Park turf.

Even the loss of Gabriel Obertan to a thigh injury could not detract from the vitality of their performance. The young winger Rolando Aarons came on in his place. He outshone Raheem Sterling, but then the paucity of service to the England winger constricted him to a bit part. That was the lot of many of his team-mates. Steven Gerrard was peripheral, Jordan Henderson looked on the fringe of the game in a wide position and only Martin Skrtel rose to the challenge of resurgent Newcastle.

The defender could have put his side ahead towards the end of the first half but he powered a header from a Gerrard corner wide of the near post. It would have been harsh on the home side, who had seen Glenn Johnson clear a Papiss Ciss[c] effort from theLiverpool goal line.

Newcastle found life after the interval and raised a storm in the closing stages. In the 74th minute Moussa Sissoko charged through, and following a mistake by Alberto Moreno, Ayoze Perez, the young Spanish forward, crashed home what proved to be the winning goal, as he had at Tottenham.

Three minutes later he broke through with Remy Cabella. Newcastle were two on one and the crowd roared for a second. Only the feet of Simon Mignolet prevented a goal. The French forward curled a shot over the crossbar soon after. The lead was more likely to be extended than lost.

The energy of those two players, like that of Jack Colback and Mehdi Abeid, sat in stark contrast to that of Mario Balotteli. The Italian cannot be afforded many more chances after such an insipid display. There was no figurehead for Brendan Rodgers. The striker is such chalk to the cheese of Luis Suarez's relentless energy. Liverpool are a different and far weaker proposition for it.

Victory moved Newcastle into the top half of the Premier League table. It was where they finished last season but their form fell off a cliff once they sold Yohan Cabaye in January. It has been a grim 2014, but perhaps, something better is emerging.

Rodgers, by contrast, must raise his players for their visit to Real Madrid on Tuesday. "Good or bad, we can't complain, we have worked very hard for a couple of years to get to this level," he said. "Playing against Real Madrid in the Bernabeu says we've been doing OK.

"There is pressure in every game at Liverpool, not just Tuesday. There is always that expectation, it's there every time we play. We understand that and accept it. It is part of being involved as players, coaches, manager at Liverpool. When you're a team that can scores goals then it gives the team confidence.

"We're finding the goals a little bit harder to come by. The players are working tirelessly on the training field but, whereas last season we scored a lot of early goals, we haven't been able to do that this season."

Brendan Rodgers insists that Liverpool are relishing the prospect of facing Real Madrid on Tuesday, but a Spaniard in the shape of Ayoze Perez delivered another ill-timed blow to their fragile confidence before they arrive at the Bernabeu. The goal scored by the Newcastle United substitute left Liverpool with just two victories in seven Premier League games and this latest setback only served to highlight the problems confronting Rodgers.

Hesitation by Alberto Moreno led to the 74th-minute winner, Raheem Sterling was a fitful influence, Steven Gerrard was on the fringes of the midfield action as speculation on his future grows and Mario Balotelli was again anonymous and has now scored only once in his last 24 Premier League appearances. Perez, in contrast, has managed more in the space of one week.

"It's a wonderful game for us on Tuesday," Rodgers said. "It is a big one against the best in the world at the moment. We will go into the game hoping to get something out of it. Good or bad, we can't complain. We have worked very hard for a couple of years to get to this level and playing against Real Madrid in the Bernabeu says we've been doing OK."

The odds are it will be a bad night for Liverpool if they fail to improve on yesterday's performance against a Newcastle team who have won four games in succession and thoroughly deserved their latest success. "It was disappointing. I didn't think we deserved to lose but didn't do enough to win it," Rodgers said. "We had enough of the ball but just lacked that bit of creativity and invention in the final third. Anything we had to deal with up until the goal we dealt with defensively, but we made a mistake and that has unfortunately cost us the game and that is the biggest disappointment."

Rodgers was rightly concerned about Liverpool's inability to create chances. "There is no magic formula, you have to continue working with the players you've got and continue to hope you get that wee bit of luck and the confidence in the final third will return.

"Over the last 18 months we have been team with a real threat going forward, but we have lost 80 per cent of our goals out of the team, with Luis Suarez going and Daniel Sturridge out. We can't keep going on about it but it is an item as to why we're not getting so many goals."

Inevitably, Rodgers had to defend Balotelli. "It wasn't his fault we lost the game, we lost it collectively." And on Sterling, he said: "He's 19 and will have days like this. He tried to create one v one situations but it wasn't his day."

It was certainly Newcastle's day as they followed up victories at Tottenham and Manchester City with another deserved success thanks to Perez, who scored at White Hart Lane and also picked up two coveted awards in Spain in midweek to acknowledge his performances for Tenerife last season. During an enterprising opening half Newcastle were denied the opener in the 37th minute when Glen Johnson headed an effort by Papiss Cisse off the line. Liverpool went close to taking an undeserved lead with their only threat of the opening half, stemming from a 39thminute corner from Gerrard that was met by defender Martin Skrtel, whose powerful header was off-target from eight yards.

Perez appeared at the start of the second half in place of the injured Cisse and there was also a slight alteration in the balance of power as Liverpool finally managed to make some attacking inroads as Balotelli came to life, albeit briefly. He went close with a free-kick from the edge of the area, then curled in another shot that was well read by keeper Tim Krul. A shot by substitute Fabio Borini was also narrowly off-target to leave Liverpool scenting an unlikely victory, only for Perez to duly score the goal that sustained Newcastle's remarkable transformation in the past month.

Perez was alive to the chance when Moreno failed to clear near the penalty spot and pounced to beat Simon Mignolet. They almost added a second goal three minutes later when another substitute, Remy Cabella, linked with Perez before steering in a shot that Mignolet saved with an outstretched leg. In the end, one goal was sufficient to prompt two Newcastle fans to hoist a sign saying "Pardew back from the dead". "Well, it is Halloween," the Newcastle manager said. Newcastle prove their mettle

It was a sight that said so much about Newcastle, as a football club, as a team and even, perhaps, as a city: two fans, dressed as the grim reaper, joyfully waving a banner that read: "Pardew, back from the dead."

The sign bounced with them in their delight, a few feet from the Newcastle dugout after the referee, Andre Marriner, had blown the final whistle to signify the conclusion of another mind-boggling week at St James' Park.

Pardew was gone by then, having hurried down a tunnel that a few weeks ago offered sanctuary from the baying mob calling for his blood. It has to be remembered how dark the mood then was around the club. A poor start to the season had left Newcastle at the foot of the Premier League table and the grim reaper would have been like an old aunt popping round for a chat for Pardew. The Newcastle manager looked dead and buried.

What he left behind him when he generously, and wisely — for there is still rehabilitation to follow his near-death experience — exited stage left was a scene of triumph. On the field a group of players were locked in an impromptu huddle. They have recovered from that desperate start to the season and found, deep in their character, a nerve that few people suspected they held.

Other players raced to join them. Among them was Remy Cabella, the big-money signing from France in the summer whose role yesterday was that of cameo, coming on as a substitute for Sammy Ameobi -- gangling brother of the former Newcastle forward Shola -- who had run himself to a standstill.

In the stands, as the clock ticked down, Mike Ashley, the club owner, wore a wry smile. He has inspired much of the head-scratching that has taken place over the past seven years at the club, but even he has had to take a back seat during the past seven days.

Newcastle had won three games in 19 before they arrived at White Hart Lane on Sunday last week. At half-time they looked beaten, but from there has come the most stunning of revivals. They beat Tottenham, won at Manchester City in the Capital One Cup, with a bit to spare as well, and carried that momentum into yesterday's game. They deservedly saw off a Liverpool side who look a sorry, jaded shadow of the ebullient team who raced into contention for the Premier League title last season.

Liverpool could not cope with Newcastle's new-found pace, or the aggression they have added to their game. When a Pardew team -- and the fact that phrase is back in anyone's vocabulary is hugely significant -- get in the face of the opposition, they do well. Liverpool looked like a boxer desperately hunting for a corner to take a breather. There were times when Newcastle smothered them. Liverpool's passing game had no oxygen. By half-time their only escape had been a well-struck Steven Gerrard corner that was headed over by Martin Skrtel. A stadium that was so conflicted a month ago, when fans held Sack-Pardew.com banners, roared their team forward.

Gabriel Obertan has epitomised the turnaround, but he was forced off after 27 minutes after damaging his thigh as he charged forward. In place of Obertan, the young winger Rolando Aarons caused problems for the Liverpool defence. He was used and moved continually.

It contrasted with the isolated Raheem Sterling.

In the 37th minute Glen Johnson headed a Papiss Cisse effort off his own goalline. At the heart of Newcastle's display was a midfield duo of Jack Colback and Mehdi Abeid, who cost next to nothing. They ran the game.

Abeid was starting his first Premier League game but it did not show -- he was excellent. Abeid clashed with Mario Balotelli just past the hour. It was the most productive part of Balotelli's afternoon. There cannot be many opportunities left. When a pass from the leftback, Alberto Moreno, did not fall to his feet, Balotelli began arguing with his teammate. He barely moved. The game went on. Brendan Rodgers' patience wore thin. "Turn around," he instructed the forward. It has been a story of turnarounds for these two clubs. Liverpool could not get any grip on the game, just as they have not got a grip on their season. Newcastle kicked down the slope towards the Gallowgate end, built steam and found another victory.

Ayoze Perez scored the winner at Tottenham, then picked up two awards at Spain's Liga de Futbol presentation in midweek. At halftime he came on for Cisse and in the 73rd minute, after a Moussa Sissoko run and an error from Moreno, he struck. There was jubilation.

Three minutes later Perez linked with Cabella and only Simon Mignolet's feet prevented a second. It did not matter. One month shy of the fourth anniversary of his arrival at Newcastle, Alan Pardew had another win over Liverpool, as he had that day. Back from the dead indeed.

Poacher Perez delights Pardew by exposing Liverpool's weakness Stoppage time was drawing to a close when Alan Pardew permitted himself a little smile and discreetly pumped a fist. Barely a fortnight ago anyone seeking the perfect definition of the term "dead man walking" needed look no further than Newcastle's manager but four successive victories have altered his landscape beyond recognition.

There was certainly no arguing with the Newcastle fan dressed as a skeleton who stood behind the home dugout at the end wearing a Halloween mask and bearing a placard declaring: "Pardew: back from the dead."

Much more of this and, rather than being sacked, English football's answer to Lazarus will be challenging for another manager-of-the-year award. He certainly succeeded in outwitting his old friend Brendan Rodgers - once his youth coach at Reading - on an afternoon when Ayoze Perez's winning goal emphasised Liverpool's disappointing inability to cope with Newcastle's formidably fleet-footed counterattacking.

Pardew has remodelled Newcastle into a beautifully calibrated 4-3-3 formation which balances his side's fantastic pace with latterly absent defensive organisation. If the emergence of Perez could not have been more timely, Mehdi Abeid, making his first Premier League start, shone in midfield alongside the outstanding Moussa Sissoko.

"If you're Newcastle manager it's not all gin and tonics and aperitifs," said a smiling Pardew. "There'll be rough days. Bobby Robson had some dark days here. "But I always knew we had good spirit and talent and it'll be fantastic in the town tonight. I might even go into the city myself - it'll be the first time in a while!" With their new configuration clearly suiting them Newcastle could have won an early penalty when Gabriel Obertan accelerated down the right and picked out Sissoko, who promptly had his heel clipped by Joe Allen. While Andre Marriner was not quite convinced, the good news for Pardew was that his players were clearly buying into a gameplan revolving around rapid changes of pace as Newcastle oscillated between tight defence and lightning breaks. The manner in which Abeid, Sissoko and Jack Colback suffocated much of Liverpool's passing at source impressed but the team's resolve was fully epitomised when Daryl Janmaat sprinted several yards to steal the ball from Jordan Henderson with a tremendous tackle.

Even when injury deprived Pardew of Obertan there was little respite for Liverpool, who found themselves instead confronted by Rolando Aarons's equally intimidating pace.

Like Newcastle, Rodgers's side are in transition but their adaptation to life after Luis Suarez seems at a painful juncture. Anfield's class of 2014-15 created only one first-half chance when Martin Skrtel directed a header narrowly wide from Steven Gerrard's corner.

Restored to a deeper, more central role than in recent months, Sissoko looks a midfielder reborn. His fine dribble late in the first half resulted in a slightly desperate challenge from Skrtel but Papiss Cisse - who earlier had a shot cleared off the line by Glen Johnson - squandered the subsequent free-kick, ballooning the ball over Simon Mignolet's bar.

Liverpool were reduced to looking distinctly ordinary and, sometimes, downright untidy. Shafts of Merseyside sunshine were rare, although Mario Balotelli did test Tim Krul with a deceptively swerving free-kick early in the second half. The Italian emerged very late for the second half but should not be made a scapegoat for Liverpool's shortcomings here. Some of Balotelli's off-the-ball movement was clever enough but, with the midfield malfunctioning, it was asking a lot to expect him to win the game single-handed.

Philippe Coutinho came closest to scoring for the visitors, his second-half header forcing Krul into a fine save. By then Cisse had been forced off with knee trouble but Pardew had a more-than-able replacement in Perez who proceeded to score his second goal in six days.

Pouncing on Alberto Moreno's failure to clear Sissoko's low cross following a one-two with Dummett, the 21-year-old intervened to incisive effect, hooking the ball home from close range. Perez subsequently very nearly created a second for Remy Cabella after playing a quick one-two with his fellow substitute but Mignolet rescued Liverpool.

Newcastle's revival under Alan Pardew continued as they picked up a fourth successive victory against a Liverpool side who continue to struggle for form. Substitute Ayoze Perez, who scored in the Magpies' win at Tottenham last week, netted the second-half winner from close range after the visitors failed to clear Paul Dummett's cross.

Newcastle also went close through Remy Cabella and Papiss Cisse as victory - their first at home over the Reds in five attempts - moved them to a point behind their opponents.

Defeat for Brendan Rodgers's side initially left them nine points behind leaders Chelsea, who stretched that margin to 12 points by winning later in the afternoon. But more worryingly is that they are six points shy of where they were at this stage last season.

While the defence is a continuing concern under Rodgers' stewardship - they have kept only one clean sheet in the last 12 matches - far more worrying is at the other end, where summer signing Mario Balotelli, a "calculated risk" as Rodgers labelled it, has not worked so far.

There was a small fanfare when he was brought in to fill the void left byLuis Suarez's move to Barcelona, but while the Uruguayan managed 31 goals last season, the Italian will be lucky to get half that total on current form. He has only scored twice for the Reds and has yet to hit the mark in the Premier League.

Here he always seemed a willing outlet for his team-mates, but Newcastle's defence had him under lock and key for much of the match.

Balotelli's game revolves around explosive power and instinct rather than guile, but he barely fired, only threatening with a first-half free-kick and a curling shot which Tim Krul easily held.

His team-mates provided little support and rarely troubled the Newcastle defence, with only headers from Martin Skrtel and Philippe Coutinho, which produced a marvellous save from Krul, causing jitters in the home backline. Despite being handicapped by injuries to winger Gabriel Obertan and striker Cisse during the match, Newcastle never looked anything but a team riding high after starting the season poorly, while the confidence gained from beating Spurs and then Manchester City in the League Cup was visible.

Having threatened with a Cisse header, which was cleared off the line by Glen Johnson, they finally broke through thanks to Perez's second successive league goal.

The Spaniard, on for Cisse, again showed a striker's instinct of being at the right place at the right time, when he slammed in from Dummett's delivery. Another summer recruit, Cabella should have added a second when he broke forward with Perez before firing a goalbound shot that was pushed wide by Simon Mignelet.

After one draw and four wins - including one in the league cup - calls for manager Pardew to be sacked seem like a distant memory.
