Liverpool are punished for late lapse in concentration

Villarreal Adrian 90+2 Liverpool Semi-final, first leg

In the space of a few seconds, the mood inside this cramped little stadium changed beyond recognition. Most of the town's population were crammed inside the Madrigal and, just when it seemed that Liverpool had frustrated the home team, Villarreal struck in stoppage time to take a slender but significant lead to Anfield for next week's Europa League semi-final second leg.

It was a sucker punch as far as Liverpool were concerned but they had invited it, appearing to tire in defence and midfield as the second half went on. A few minutes before the goal, Kolo Toure, standing in for the shamed Mamadou Sakho, seemed to be out on his feet. There was a let-off for Jurgen Klopp's team when Cedric Bakambu got behind Toure in the final minutes and forced Simon Mignolet into an excellent save, but that alarm call was not heeded. In stoppage time, Adam Lallana lost the ball, Denis Suarez escaped, down the inside-right channel, and crossed for Adrian Lopez to tap in from close range.

Klopp might wonder whether Liverpool's hopes would have been better served by pushing harder in search of an away goal. He went without a recognised centre forward, preferring Roberto Firmino to Daniel Sturridge, and while Liverpool played their way into a number of promising situations, building up steadily, there was rarely an incisive pass or a penetrative run.

By the interval, both teams could point to opportunities that had passed them by. The best chance by far for Liverpool fell to Joe Allen in the fifth minute. There was nothing wrong with his run towards the penalty area -- which meant that he was in the perfect place, just by the penalty spot, when Lallana's cross was deflected into his path -- but Allen is not the player you would want such a chance to fall to. His shot was weak, lacking conviction, and made for a comfortable save for Sergio Asenjo. That was the only shot that Asenjo had to save in the first half, but Liverpool had enough pressure deep in Villarreal territory to suggest that there was something to be had here. Allen, Lallana, Coutinho and James Milner were prominently involved in their build-up play and Nathaniel Clyne and Alberto Moreno were willing to get forward from the full-back positions. The problem was that, with Villarreal defending in a disciplined manner, Liverpool were being reduced to snap-shots. Lucas Leiva flashed one just wide of a post but Coutinho and Lallana were wasteful, guilty of trying to force the issue rather than look for the killer pass, which both of them are often astute enough to find.

The other concern for Liverpool was that, while they were keeping their opponents at arm's length for periods, Villarreal had a change of pace -- through Bruno Soriano's passing and the quick feet of Jonathan dos Santos and Suarez on the wings -- that threatened to make life difficult.

Toure was playing well alongside Dejan Lovren in central defence, standing in for Sakho after the France defender's positive drugs test, but Clyne and Moreno had their work cut out against Suarez and Dos Santos respectively. Most of Villarreal's best moments came from the two wingers. An excellent Suarez cross only narrowly eluded Bakambu, the prolific Villarreal striker, in the opening minutes. Dos Santos got away from Moreno down the right flank and picked out Tomas Pina, whose shot was saved awkwardly by Mignolet, diving low to his left. When the ball ran loose, Pina had another go, which was blocked by Milner this time. As well as their promise in wide areas, Villarreal were capable of playing some nice stuff through the middle. Roberto Soldado, the former Tottenham Hotspur forward, should have given the Spanish team the lead when he was picked out by Bruno's free kick, which was dinked over the Liverpool defence before either Toure or Moreno could react. Soldado waited for the ball to sit up nicely but his shot was dragged wide of the far post. Opportunity knocked for Mario Gaspar late in the first half, from another excellent Bruno pass, but the full back's cross was blocked by Toure and his shot was deflected over by Lovren.

Liverpool were defending well but they had a let-off in the opening minute of the second half. From a Suarez corner, Bakambu leapt highest on the corner of the six-yard box and sent a header against the near post. On the touchline, Klopp breathed a sigh of relief. By that stage, Klopp had sent on Jordon Ibe in place of Coutinho, who had been unwell after returning to the dressing room at half-time. That gave Liverpool more pace but less guile. They were looking to Firmino for inspiration and just after the hour mark the Brazil playmaker almost found it, his shot pushed on to the post after he was found in the penalty area by Milner. Still, Sturridge sat on the bench, with Klopp happy with the balance of Liverpool's attacking play. There was another glimmer of an opening midway through the second half when Allen and Clyne combined down the right, but when the full back's cross pinged around the penalty area, Lallana failed to capitalise. Minutes later, the England playmaker got away from the home defence but was incorrectly flagged offside. It seemed to be coasting towards a goalless draw, but there was to be a frantic finale. At one end, Bakambu raced through for what looked certain to be a goal, only to be denied impressively by Mignolet. From the resulting corner, Toure's clearance and a slip by Suarez resulted in a breakaway for Moreno, whose pace took him clear but his shot was as erratic as you would expect of a full back who had sprinted the length of the pitch in the 89th minute. When Klopp finally decided to throw on a striker, it was Christian Benteke, back from injury, rather than Sturridge. That seemed a move designed to eat up time more than anything, but within minutes Villarreal had scored through a substitution of their own, Adrian coming off the bench to score. Once again, Liverpool will have to do it the hard way at Anfield.

Liverpool dealt sucker-punch at the last by Villarreal's Adrián López

This time Liverpool took the stoppage time sucker-punch. The Europa Leaguesemi-final had been Borussia Dortmund in reverse -- devoid of the drama, incident and sense of occasion that made for that extraordinary quarter-final -- when Villarreal conjured a similarity that Jürgen Klopp could have done without. Adrián López's 92nd-minute winner leaves Liverpool in need of another Anfield recovery next week. "We were lucky enough to score," said Marcelino, the Villarreal coach. "But it was not an unfair result." Klopp viewed it through a different lens. His team had produced a resolute, disciplined and patient European away display to remain on course for the final in Basel, Europa League success and qualification for the Champions League but it was undermined by one disorganised moment and precise counter-attack. In injury time, with Liverpool on the front foot, Adam Lallana lost possession and Villarreal broke through their stylish captain, Bruno Soriano. The midfielder swept a perfect pass over the exposed Kolo Touré to Denis Suárez, the former Manchester City academy prospect cut in behind and squared across Simon Mignolet for the substitute López to convert into an unguarded net. In the 91st minute against Dortmund it was Dejan Lovren who transformed the tie. The 92nd minute did not transform the semi-final, Anfield was always likely to be a decisive factor, but it has made Liverpool's task more complicated than it needed to be. The Beatles' Yellow Submarine, the nickname adopted by Villarreal as they began their remarkable rise up the ranks in Spain, replaced their traditional pre-match anthem at El Madrigal and helped to create a jovial atmosphere. Ringo does not do intimidation. A banner containing the Villarreal crest, 96 and You'll Never Walk Alone also showed how this week's inquest verdicts on the Hillsborough disaster have been felt throughout football. But the Spanish club from a town of just over 51,000 inhabitants were not so accommodating on the pitch as they pursued a first appearance in a European final. Bruno immediately began dictating play from deep in central midfield and there was a clear purpose from Marcelino's side in possession as they looked to both wide men, Suarez and Jonathan Dos Santos, to stretchLiverpool. But it was the visitors who created the first real chance of the semi-final and should have claimed a valuable away goal inside five minutes.

James Milner released Lallana into space down the right and his low cross deflected perfectly off a home defender into the path of Joe Allen as he arrived in the area. Unmarked, from the penalty spot, the Wales international side-footed tamely straight at Sergio Asenjo. The Villarreal goalkeeper was not tested again before the interval. A big opportunity wasted. Klopp had started with Roberto Firmino leading the Liverpool attack and without Daniel Sturridge for the third consecutive European game. The decision to omit the England international was justified by Divock Origi's contribution against Borussia Dortmund and explained here by the need for intelligent movement in the absence of the injured Belgium international. Firmino struggled to vindicate the call in the first half, rarely featuring in the contest but, in fairness, receiving little supply too. The Brazilian's contribution and the latest demotion for a big European occasion will not have been lost on Sturridge as he looked on from the substitutes' bench.

Villarreal were sharp and inventive in possession but frequent attempts to thread a final ball through to Cédric Bakambu or Roberto Soldado were thwarted by the defensive instincts of Dejan Lovren and Touré, Klopp's preferred replacement for the suspended Mamadou Sakho. But they did have their moments in the goalless first half. Soldado dragged a difficult chance wide from Bruno's chipped free-kick and went close with a curling shot from the edge of the area. A vital challenge from Alberto Moreno deflected Mario Gaspar's shot over after Villarreal had again looked to get in behind the Liverpool left-back. Their best chance fell to Tomás Pina after Bakambu and Soldado had combined inside the box and Simon Mignolet produced a fine save from the midfielder's low drive towards the bottom corner.

It became a test of organisation and discipline for Klopp's men and the midfield trio of Milner, Lucas Leiva and Allen, while not one many would pay to watch for invention, were integral in stifling Villarreal until the final act. Liverpool lost Philippe Coutinho to illness at half-time and their concentration seconds after the restart. Bakambu, an obvious threat with nine goals in 11 Europa League ties this season, was left unmarked at a Dos Santos corner but fortunately for the visitors the Congo international steered his header against the outside of a post. Liverpool received another reprieve when Gaspar elected to shoot from a tight angle despite Bakambu being unmarked in the six-yard box, with inevitable repercussions. The ball flew harmlessly over Mignolet's goal and the right-back got an earful from the striker.

Incident was sorely lacking but Firmino posed more problems for the home defence in the second half as he concentrated his runs on the penalty area rather than out wide. Milner picked him out with one measured pass and it required a

 Klopp goes for the grafters, and you can see why As per, the pre-match speculation was right. Daniel Sturridge benched, with Roberto Firmino chosen to lead the line. Disappointing for the England man? Most definitely. Sturridge's form has been very good, so to miss out on a place in the XI will have hurt. He's hungry, he says, and a substitute's meal will never be enough for him. Klopp's selection here, though, was drenched in logic. This was a team to graft, to push from the front and run Villarreal all over the park. The Spaniards are a team which plays from the back, and so meeting them high up the pitch was necessary. Firmino, although not in sparkling form coming into the game, would allow them to do that, and enable them to beef up the centre of midfield, where James Milner and Joe Allen assisted Lucas. The graft was needed. Villarreal were organised, composed, willing to be patient and defended in numbers when they had to. They were happy to have possession in their own half and waited, as Klopp predicted, to pounce on any mistakes at the other end. The surprise, though, was that Sturridge was not seen at all. Jordon Ibe replaced the ill Coutinho at half time, and did very little, and then Christian Benteke was sent on for three minutes of added time as Firmino went off. Surely we'll see him at Anfield? Liverpool need him. It's going to be tense again "All you need is goals," boomed the front cover of Spanish sports daily Marca on Thursday morning. A few shots and a bit of drama would have been a start, to be honest. Though when that eventually arrived, it was at the wrong end from a Liverpool perspective. Ninety-two minutes of monotony followed by a sucker punch. Painful. This was not a game that will live long in the memory by any means, but Villarreal's late winner leaves the tie delicately poised for next week. Liverpool can afford no mistakes at Anfield. Having the second leg at home always looked an advantage, but we will see if that is the case. The atmosphere should be electric next Thursday, but you'll be able to cut the tension with a knife, one imagines. Get ready to chew those fingernails....we've been here before. Joe 2.0 will be hard to shift If only he'd brought his shooting boots. Aside from a tentatively-taken early chance – the best of the half where Liverpool were concerned – there was very little to criticise about Joe Allen here. Confident, composed and playing with a self-belief that stands out a mile, the Welshman continued his impressive recent form. He passed it well, covered the spaces and collected second balls, got Liverpool playing forwards and never looked flustered. He's in the side partly because of the misfortune of others, but that's not his problem. And if he carries on like this, he'll be hard to shift from that midfield. He's a man in form, and growing in stature with each passing game. Villarreal's weakness is clear... If Liverpool are to book their place in Basel, then they must make sure they expose Villarreal's clear weakness. From the off, the bulk of the Reds' joy came down their right flank, where Jaime Costa was left exposed by Denis Suarez's refusal to help out defensively. James Milner, Nathaniel Clyne and Adam Lallana managed to swarm around the Villarreal left back, creating overloads and good positions in and around the box. Had they had a more obvious target to cross to, or a bit more quality with their final pass, they would have found a way through. Costa was preferred to Antonio Rukavina, who played under Klopp at Dortmund, but will need more support at Anfield if Villarreal are to keep the Reds out. Liverpool, meanwhile, need to find a way to maximise the space on offer. They didn't here, which will be a real source of regret. Villarreal is no Dortmund, but their atmosphere was a positive one The contrast with the last round was obvious. Around 2,000 Liverpool fans made the trip for this one, but they were scattered between Villarreal itself, with many opting for short hopes in from Valencia, Castellon or even neighbouring Benidorm – the stories from those trips should last! It meant a rather more serene atmosphere than there had been in Dortmund, where the city had been completely geared towards the game. No standstills, just a few flags and the odd pub lined with Reds. And then a mood-killing cab or bus ride to the ground. Still, the hosts did what they could to make it a carnival atmosphere. Both teams were greeted by a brass band upon arrival at El Madrigal, where the tight surrounding streets suddenly came alive. Pleasingly, there were also some classy gestures from the home supporters prior to kick off, including a much-appreciated tribute to the Hillsborough victims. The mood was certainly convivial rather than confrontational, with red shirts mixing with yellow both inside and outside the ground - a welcome break from the sniping and the arguing and the point-scoring seen in other ties. The Beatles' 'Yellow Submarine' replaced the traditional Villarreal pre-match anthem. Some may argue that the edge and the rivalry is what makes big games, but there is something good about a European away trip where steering clear of harm is not at the forefront of travelling supporters' minds. Hopefully, the attitude of Augsburg, Dortmund and Villarreal fans will catch on...

 Un gol de Adrián en el segundo minuto de la prolongación dio la victoria al Villarreal en El Madrigal ante el Liverpool (1-0) que acercó al equipo amarillo al sueño de acceder por primera vez en su historia a la final de la Europa League. El Villarreal tratará en el mítico estadio de Anfield de conseguir su objetivo tras haber ganado en casa un partido muy nivelado entre dos conjuntos de un potencial muy similar y cuyo resultado deja abiertas las posibilidades de ambos para estar en la final del día 18 de mayo en Basilea (Suiza). Tanto el técnico local, Marcelino García Toral, como el alemán del Liverpool, Jürgen Klopp, tenían claro el tipo de partido que pretendían que se jugara y consiguieron su objetivo, ya que unos y otros se neutralizaron a la perfección. Por ello se vio un encuentro sin tregua pero marcado por la intención de unos y otros de combinar la búsqueda del gol a favor con la obligación de no recibirlo y que se resolvió cuando nadie pensaba en que iba a llegar el gol. La primera mitad ya estuvo marcada por la igualdad y por la intensidad con la que se emplearon ambos conjuntos y aunque de entrada el Villarreal dominó más que su rival, la primera opción de gol fue para el forastero Allen en un remate centrado que detuvo sin problemas Aensjo. Esta dinámica continuó hasta el cuarto de hora de juego, pero a partir de entonces el Liverpool mejoró en su funcionamiento colectivo y el equilibrio de fuerzas pasó a ser mayor si cabe, aunque en esta fase del partido la opción más clara de gol fue para el equipo local en un doble remate de Pina (m.21). A partir de ese momento se vivió un tramo final del primer tiempo muy táctico, en el que unos y otros trataron de crear sus ocasiones de gol, pero en el que era importante no perder la posición y no dar opción al rival, conscientes ambos del valor que podría tener para cualquier error propio o ajeno para el desarrollo del choque. Con la igualdad como característica de una primera mitad nivelada, Soldado tuvo la oportunidad de abrir el marcador en una acción aislada en el minuto 42, pero la igualdad a cero que se mantuvo hasta el 45 reflejó a la perfección el desempeño de uno y otro equipo en la primera mitad del choque. La segunda mitad dio comienzo con la entrada de Ibe por Coutinho en el equipo visitante y un remate de cabeza al poste de Bakambu a la salida de un córner en el primer minuto de juego. Tras esa acción, el encuentro mantuvo la tónica del primer periodo en cuanto a equilibrio de fuerzas, pero pasó a ser mucho más abierto con constantes alternativas ante una y otra portería y con una ocasión clara para el Liverpool ya que el segundo balón al poste del partido llegó en un remate de Firmino (m.65). El choque entró en su recta final sin apenas variaciones y con el convencimiento por parte de ambos conjuntos de que restan los noventa minutos que se disputarán en Anfield la semana que viene. A cuatro minutos del final, Mignolet desbarató una aproximación muy peligrosa de Bakambu, pero de inmediato una contra de Alberto Moreno pudo haber abierto el marcador para el equipo inglés. Por entonces, todavía no había llegado la jugada que resolvería el encuentro con un balón de Bruno que le llegó a Denis Suárez, quien tras una gran jugada, cedió el balón a Adrián para que empujara el balón e hiciera el 1-0 en el segundo minuto de la prolongación.

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Liverpool's ambitions of reaching their first European final in almost a decade suffered a blow as Villarreal netted an injury-time winner in the first leg. After a first half of few chances, Cedric Bakambu's header clipped the Reds upright shortly after the break. Liverpool went closest when Roberto Firmino's low shot hit the post. The Reds looked set for a creditable draw in Spain until they switched off to allow substitute Adrian Lopez to tap in Denis Suarez's low cross. Despite the dramatic winner, the Europa League semi-final still remains delicately poised before next Thursday's return leg at Anfield. The winners will face either Spanish holders Sevilla or Ukrainian side Shakhtar Donetsk, who drew 2-2 in their first leg, in the Swiss city of Basel on 18 May.

Could late defensive lapse prove costly?

Liverpool have not reached a European final since losing to AC Milan in the 2007 Champions League showpiece, but a stoic display at La Liga's fourth-placed team looked set to leave them a home win away from ending that barren run. However, the Premier League side lost their defensive discipline in the final few seconds - and it could prove crucial. Left-back Alberto Moreno wandered up field, leaving the space for former Manchester City youngster Suarez to exploit before squaring to Lopez for the easiest of finishes. BBC Radio 5 live summariser and former Reds defender Mark Lawrenson said: "Where did the left-back disappear to? Injury time at 0-0 in a Europa League semi-final - and he's probably 70 metres up the pitch. "0-0 would have been a very good result. All of a sudden because of one aberration you're under pressure for the second leg." Liverpool will have to score at least twice to go through in 90 minutes at Anfield, but Villarreal know an away goal would mean the Reds then need a minimum of three.

Reds lack attacking threat

Jurgen Klopp's Liverpool side were installed as favourites to win Europe's secondary club competition after their thrilling quarter-final win against Bundesliga club Borussia Dortmund. Publicly the 48-year-old German insists there has been no thought about the possibility of reaching the final - but winning the trophy will cap an encouraging debut season with a place in next season's Champions League. His predecessor, Brendan Rodgers, named an inexperienced side in the Reds' opening two matches in the competition, but Klopp has chosen stronger teams since arriving in early October. However, he decided to play without a recognised striker at Villarreal, leaving England international Daniel Sturridge on the bench throughout - and the Reds offered little attacking threat. Wales midfielder Joe Allen wasted the best chance in a tight first half, side-footing straight at home keeper Sergio Asenjo early on. Further opportunities were rare, although Brazil forward Firmino - playing as Liverpool's most advanced player - thumped an angled 12-yard drive against the base of the right post.

Villarreal pay Hillsborough tribute

Liverpool were playing their first match since inquests concluded 96 Reds supporters who died as a result of a crush in the 1989 Hillsborough disaster were unlawfully killed.

Villarreal paid tribute to the victims by providing a banner - bearing the number 96 and Liverpool club slogan 'You'll Never Walk Alone' - for their fans to hold up before kick-off.

"We were very saddened by the Hillsborough tragedy and we planned events to show the solidarity and support which our club and our fans have with Liverpool and those who were affected," said the Spanish club.

'This race is not over'

Liverpool boss Jurgen Klopp:

"Of course I'm not too happy with the goal we conceded in the last second. Counter-attacking in the 92nd minute makes not much sense - but it is only the first leg.

"It is 1-0 and they have to come to Anfield where we know how strong we are. We had our moments, we defended really good. This race is not over.

"If we had enough players around the box it was no problem but they played this one chip ball over Kolo [Toure], I don't know where Alberto [Moreno] was in this moment but that was the only big mistake we made in this game and they scored with it."

Villarreal manager Marcelino:

"Until the final whistle you can score or concede a goal and this time we were lucky enough to score in the very last minute.

"We managed a good result but we don't know if it will be enough or not until the end of the tie.

"It was not an unfair result and we didn't beat Liverpool by being lucky."

What's next?

Seventh-placed Liverpool return to Premier League action with a visit to 15th-placed Swansea on Sunday.

The Reds look unlikely to earn Champions League qualification through the Premier League, sitting nine points behind fourth-placed Arsenal with four matches left, although they do have a game in hand on the Gunners. Villarreal are better positioned to earn La Liga's final qualifying spot, holding a four-point advantage over Celta Vigo with three matches remaining.

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
